### **Defibrillator at the Community Hall**



Thanks to the generosity of Sutton Coldfield Town Council the Community Hall will soon be host to a defibrillator. The Town Council is in the process of finalising the host arrangements with the hall. It is then the intention to offer leaders of classes at the hall, the participants in the classes and other residents, a demonstration by Community Heartbeat Trust. The Neighbourhood Forum has offered its Forum meeting on 28th January as a possible occasion for the demonstration, but it could be any time, any place, early next year.















Make the most of this coloured edition, it may well be the first and last. When we applied to The Big Lottery for funding for a Social Media Awareness Course we included two coloured editions to report on how the course progressed. We are pleased to say that, to date, we have had three runs of 6 weeks, one on Mondays, one on Thursdays and one on Tuesdays. Some residents have attended several sessions, others just the one or two. What we have experienced are a continuous stream of new attendees as the word has spread. The topics covered have been varied and have involved connecting phones to laptops / desktops and Fitbits, as well as connecting to Twitter, Facebook, WhatsApp, LinkedIn and reading the news and watching films and TV on phones and tablets. It has lead us to believe that a second course may be necessary for those residents who may, or may not, have a smartphone, desktop or laptop. We are currently working on a course for the use of tablets, which are the cheapest items of equipment to introduce residents to the internet. Once on the internet they can keep in touch with friends and relatives, wherever they are. Also, they can take advantage of lower prices on the internet and access government websites, e.g., renewing road tax. Louise Passey: Unfortunately due to a number of commitments I won't be contributing this month. I will put a piece in for next time.

**Kath Scott:** Kath is also overwhelmed at the moment and has asked to remind residents of the Advice Bureau which is at Boldmere Library on the last Thursday of each month, from 2.00 - 3.00 p.m.

**Rob Pocock:** Once again I seem to have spent a lot of the last month chasing up missed rubbish bin collections. I am definitely becoming the bin-man expert! I thought things had settled down pretty well after last year's bin strike, but this autumn there have been some new changes to the routes that the trucks are taking, and there are also some new crewmen and drivers covering our area. This has slowed them down for a while, and some days they have not been able to complete the new round by the end of the day, so the stuff gets left. The recycling collections seem the most affected. The worst part about the recent problems, has been the delay in coming back and collecting what they have missed. This has taken far too long. I have been chasing the Depot about this and will continue to do so until the situation improves.

Another lively topic that Kath and I have been taking up, is the move to charge cars for parking in Sutton Park. This will be an item at our next Public Ward Meeting on Tues 13<sup>th</sup> Nov, 7pm in the Carpenters Arms. As a Sutton Town Councillor, I am pressing the Town Council to re-introduce the Sutton Free Pass, which used to exist when the former Sutton Town Council charged for parking in the Park pre 1974. The Town Council has a large surplus of £3 million un-spent money, which residents pay in their supplementary precept – so here is an excellent opportunity to make proper use of it!

Manish Puri: This month I've been working with my fellow Vesey Councillors to develop our program of public meetings. I have been giving some thought to the future of Sutton Coldfield Town Centre in light of future opportunities from potential investment by HS2, Birmingham City Council's plans and the developments in Minworth and Langley. Against this there is the challenge of reimagining the Town Centre in light of the revolution in shopping, business, living and entertainment that the internet continues to present.

Locally I follow with interest plans for a Multi-Academy Trust involving Boldmere Schools and parental reaction and am petitioning Royal Sutton Coldfield Town Council to create a safer crossing into Sutton Park at Boldmere Gate. https://you.38degrees.org.uk/petitions/a-zebra-crossing-for-monmouth-drive-for-safer-entry-to-sutton-park

Janet Cairns: I am very excited about the news that Sutton Coldfield Town Council have welcomed the social inclusion report for Sutton Coldfield from consultant Alison Seabrook and will be creating a health and well-being committee. Please come along, we want to hear your views and what residents want for Sutton Coldfield. I am also strongly in support of giving the park back to Sutton Coldfield residents and not charging for parking in the park.

According to Martin Pedley who chairs the shop keepers and traders in Boldmere, there is a WhatsApp communication system around Boldmere which gives advance warnings about various misdemeanours happening in the area. Perhaps there should be something similar in the Banners Gate area which could be sent to the blog. **Conclusion** - The Chairman thanked everyone for coming to the meeting and announced that the next forum meeting will be on November 26<sup>th</sup> 2018.

## Talk from Bob Green – a member of the Sutton Coldfield Speaker's Club – all about the 1950s

Three years ago, he was seriously ill and spent 57 nights in Heartlands and Good Hope hospitals. To thank the medical staff for his care he decided to join the Friends of Good Hope and raise money for all the things that the NHS does not cover, such as a toiletry pack if you suddenly need to spend the night.

"I was a war baby. These days the kids have iphones, ipods and ipads, we had 'hide and seek'. I grew up in a street of girls and was always outvoted when wanting to play "doctors and nurses".

We had a wireless with three channels – Light, Home and Third programmes. There was also Radio Luxembourg, and can you remember Horace Bachelor and how to spell K -e-y-n-s-h-a-m?

Then there was Uncle Mac at 9 o'clock on a Saturday morning who played all the old songs like; Puff the Magic Dragon and the Laughing Policeman. Do you remember the Billy Cotton Band Show and Educating Archie (who was better on radio than television)? Today, they say it is

an age of austerity. The 50s were austere. There were queues along the pavements with ration books; all cars were black; photos and TVs were black and white and programmes closed down between 5 o'clock and 7 o'clock each evening for tea time and to allow the children to be put to bed. Toilet paper was white (or just black and white because it was newspaper on a string).

I started school in 1950 at the Infants' school. I walked there, walked back for lunch and then back again and then back at the end of the day, whether it was raining, snowing or sun shining. I was not driven to school in a 4x4. On a rainy day there would be 40 pairs of wellies all around the boiler. The crates of milk (one third of a pint) for break time refreshment would be frozen in winter and often rancid in summer and on Friday morning you could buy a stamp with a picture of one of the Royal Family. May Day was not a Bank Holiday, but you had to dance around a maypole to make patterns with the ribbons. When I moved up to the Primary school, I had to walk one and a half miles across fields and along lanes to get there. Now the route is covered by the Lichfield by-pass. We all used to pick wild flowers and press them; tell the time with dandelions and see whether you liked butter with a buttercup. Very often most children went off to play for the day with a bottle of water and some jam sandwiches. In the autumn everyone played conkers. Nowadays this is banned in schools because of Health and Safety rules. In winter, on any incline, we made slides in the snow and ice and bruised a lot of ourselves. I was a sickly child and had to go to the clinic to sit by a sunray lamp to "build myself up" because I caught all the usual childhood illnesses. I had to have two teaspoonfuls of medicine every four hours and so my mother used to cycle all the way to school and give it to me through the railings. I started secondary school in short trousers and a cap. It seemed to take three years to make my pencil case in woodwork lessons which gave me the skills to make a wardrobe when I was married and moved into our first home. I was friends at school with a fat boy called Carlos. I was the second fattest boy in the class. We both hated Wednesdays because it was Games day. I was no good at cricket and was always the last to be picked for a team. I couldn't run, couldn't throw, couldn't bat, couldn't catch, but I could put away the equipment. I was quite successful with swimming which we did at a council owned pool. I won the 50 metres butterfly because everyone else was disqualified. The changing rooms were communal and had saloon type doors (no top or bottom). Your clothes were left in a heap and were often pretty damp when you came

me from doing exercise like this. Sports Day for all the children consisted of the sack race, egg and spoon race, wheelbarrow race and obstacle race. Many people bought a TV set because of the Coronation on 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1953. The screen was tiny and most of the street came in to watch one TV. The popular programmes then for children were Muffin the Mule, Andy Pandy and the Flower Pot Men. Only 40 hours of television was allowed per week and when ATV started there were numerous advertising tunes and slogans that I can remember even today, such as the Murray Mint's tune and 'Go to Work on an Egg'." Bob came up with many, many jokes but for "copyright" reasons we are not including them here and because you may be lucky enough to attend one of his talks and they are funnier spoken than written.

Christmas is fast approaching; Royal Mail & The Trading Standards Office are making people aware of the following scam: A card is posted through your door from a company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906 6611911 (a Premium rate number).

If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £315 for the phone call. If you do receive a card with these details, then please contact Royal Mail Fraud on 020 7239 6655.

### From the last police tasking meeting

PCSO Ian Willets took the chair and over the course of two hours we learned several interesting facts.

**First:** Change the locks on your plastic doors to anti-snap locks, if you haven't already done so. The following link is to a short YouTube example of what the difference is between an ordinary euro cylinder and an anti-snap lock. This video is not a recommendation, just an example. **Second:** there have been car key thefts, but they have reduced from 9 in June to 7 in July, just 2 in August and zero in September. That does nor mean they have stopped forever, maybe the thieves have gone on holidays!! If you have a keyless fob keep it in a tin or wrap it in foil so that it cannot be "read" by someone, with the right equipment, at your front door. Do not keep ordinary car keys where they can be seen if someone looks through the letterbox. It has been known for them to be picked up with a fishing rod, or something similar.

**Third:** cars parked on pavements can be very, very annoying. I know, I use a wheelchair! If this is a problem that you are frequently up against then this may solve your problem – but there are catches.

Take a photograph of the offending vehicle showing the gap left between the vehicle and the wall or hedge. The registration plate must also be on the photo. Include time and date of when the photo was taken. West Midlands Police receive many such photos so, to be considered, it must be a cast iron example of obstructive parking. Any doubt and it will not be considered. There are two catches: your photo will not be acknowledged due to lack of man/womanpower; you must include you name and address just in case it goes to court when you may have to state that it was you who took the photo. Please remember, there must be no doubt that the vehicle is obstructing the pavement, otherwise you will be wasting your time and lan's time.

**Last:** there's Street Watch as well as Neighbourhood Watch. Street Watch volunteers are expected to give 2 hours each month. You patrol in pairs wearing hi-vis jackets. The display at the Banners Gate entrance to Sutton Park was so lovely, we would like ours to look similar, i.e., with changes of colour when one planting dies and another grows to take its place. The committee are also considering benches and we wondered what the availability would be for the off-cuts from any oak trees in Sutton

Park. We would then fund their construction with a local group. Also being mindful of the security, we would like to place these strategically to try and make it more difficult to drive unwanted vehicles onto the field. It would be ideal to place the trees in the areas of the bund where there are gaps. If you have any ideas for trees please let us know.

## Cyber Scam Alert & How to Keep Them Out

Dear Residents, Please read and share with friends and family members:

### Extortion Scam

Cyber criminals send victims their own passwords. Cyber criminals are attempting to blackmail unsuspecting victims by claiming to have used the victims' password to install spying malware on the victims' computer. The criminals claim they've recorded videos of the victim watching adult material by activating their webcam when they visit these websites. What makes this scam so convincing is that the email usually includes a genuine password the victim has used for one of their online accounts. We believe criminals obtain the passwords from data breaches.

What to do if you get one of these emails?

Don't reply to the email or be pressured into paying. The police advise that you do not pay criminals. Try flagging the email as spam/junk if you receive it multiple times. Perform a password reset as soon as possible on any accounts where you've used the password mentioned in the email. Always use a strong, separate password for important accounts, such as your email. Where available, enable two-factor authentication (2FA). Always install the latest software and app updates. Install, or enable, anti-virus software on your laptops and computers and keep it updated.

If you receive one of these emails, report it to Action Fraud's phishing reporting tool. If you have received one of these emails and paid the ransom, report it to your local police force on 101 providing all the relevant details.

### **How To Keep The Cyber-Criminals Out**

Cyber-criminals use weaknesses in software and apps to attack your devices and steal your identity. Software updates are designed to fix these weaknesses and installing them as soon as possible will keep your devices & data secure.

Software updates don't have to get in the way of what you're doing. You can choose to install them at night, when your device is plugged in and connected to wi-fi. You can also configure most devices to automatically install software and app updates.


