Alison Jolley: Through and beyond The Gate On Thursday 22nd July I very much enjoyed and helped celebrate the official opening of Hope Food North Birmingham, at their base in Mere Green. I was joined by fellow town

councillors the Mayor of Sutton Coldfield, Terry Wood and also Cllr. Jane Mosson, an active supporter of this charity. Sutton Coldfield Town Council has helped finance this venture through the Council's Community Grant Programme.



Every day numerous community events and initiatives such as these take place throughout our town . I think I am right in saying that we all want to know what's going

on in neighbouring areas particularly as they can benefit residents throughout the whole of Sutton and well beyond into other neighbouring communities as they expand and develop further.

Therefore, I am publicising this new Sutton Coldfield food bank that is thriving through the dedication of volunteers, first coming together over a year ago at the start of the pandemic and naming themselves 'Hope for Sutton' and gratefully using St James Church, Mere Green as their first home. From here countless bags of food were soon

distributed, with many residents helping with delivery and collection of donated food items throughout all areas of our town.

They have now grown the charity further and just a couple of months ago moved over the road to the Arc Community Church Centre, St James Rd. Mere Green and are now known as 'Hope Food North Birmingham'

rob.pocock@birmingham.gov.uk. As I said in my report in the last issue of GatePost, the Council made a blunder in not consulting anyone (including ourselves) before the event went ahead. As your Councillors, we're determined that residents get the chance to air their views (whether positive or negative) and we'll ensure your views get back to the City Parks service as soon as possible.

Moving on to our continuing work to support the landscape restoration work in Sutton Park. We got an excellent presentation at our 'virtual' Vesey Ward Public Meeting at the end of July, from Danny Squire the head of the ranger service. He gave an update on the removal of overgrown birch woods in the area between the Flying Field and Longmoor Pool. This is allowing the undergrowth to regenerate and to be regularly cropped by cattle, rabbits etc. This was the land management regime in the medieval period when so much of our Sutton Park was created in its current form.

From the late Victorian period to the early 2000's, this land management method was neglected and this allowed excessive tree growth that risks suffocating the natural heathlands that occupy much of the western area of the Park. Thanks to the efforts of Danny and his colleagues over recent years, the Park is at last starting to revert to the original landscape and unique ecology of the managed medieval period. Danny's team have had to ensure angry words from some visitors calling them 'vandals desecrating our Park'; these comments are made out of ignorance of the true nature and virtue of our Rangers' long term project. One of my major aims is to help everyone understand what is being done in the hope that they will take a more enlightened attitude to the forethought and hard work of our Ranger service. They are restoring a century of neglect (going back well before Birmingham was involved!), and they are going to leave a fine legacy for our future generations.

Kath Scott:

I am so very proud to expand on the continued success of our Vesey Ward SpeedWatch Groups. Special thanks should go to the resident volunteers behind its successful expansion across

the Ward, together with the Vesey Neighbourhood Police. To let you know, I can show you below how many watches have taken place & how many cars have been warned about their speed. No. offences recorded through Vesey Speedwatch patrols since 28/07/2020:

- >186 drivers at or above 35mph in 30mph limit (Limit +10% +2mph - ACPO guidelines)
- Fastest: 51mph on quiet residential roads.

- •A majority of drivers exceed the speed limit everywhere
- More drivers are speeding than ever before the Police statistics show this
- •Excessive speed is detested in our communities
- Speedwatch gets enthusiastic support from residents
- Good publicity attracts volunteers and encourages new groups to form
- Speedwatch letters are effective, but there are still persistent offenders
- •Traffic Police resources are limited, and road safety stats are opaque
- •Street signs, speed indicator signs and road markings are ignored.
- •Speed bumps increase noise & pollution as drivers brake and accelerate, inconvenience emergency vehicles, and are generally ineffective
- Slow streets are safe streets

What we need

- •More Speedwatch volunteers the main constraint on the number of sessions that can be
- •A PCSO to continue to be available for every session Community Streetwatch can run
- •An easier way of scheduling volunteers' and PCSOs' availability
- Roads Policing to be highlighted and prioritised by the Police and Crime Commissioner
- Accurate Road Safety stats to be published as an aid to transparency, accountability and public awareness

WIDENING DISABILITY ACCESS THROUGHOUT SUTTON COLDFIELD

In the last edition of Gatepost we highlighted the launch of an exciting new project supported by the Sutton Coldfield Neighbourhood Network Scheme and Royal Sutton Coldfield Town Council. We welcome the participation of commercial businesses, local charities, church groups and other support groups and enterprises to participate in the survey, user group and premises access pledge.

There are five Objectives:

- 1. To establish a **Sutton Coldfield Adult Disability User Group**. The User Group is intended to have diverse members to represent the broader disabilities and support networks within Sutton Coldfield. This will be Chaired by Tony Willis.
- 2. Local Business Premises Access Pledge and a **Disability Recognition Certificate** for participating businesses.
- 3. A **Sutton Coldfield Disability Access Scoping Questionnaire** in partnership with Sutton Coldfield Neighbourhood Network Scheme with the purpose of increasing the number and variety of local opportunities that Disabled Adults can use.
- 4. Enhancing existing information and online portals enabling those with disabilities and their carers to have confidence to journey outside of their home environments and to be aware of the access available to get to venues, premises, open spaces and events.
- 5. To input into the respective "Strategic Priorities" of Royal Sutton Coldfield Town Council, Birmingham City Council and West Midlands Combined Authority promoting disability independence in large scale projects and the Regeneration of Sutton Coldfield Town Centre and the Transport Hub/Network.

Phase 1 has started with surveys going out to many local businesses and organisations. If you haven't received one, and would like to participate please e-mail bgatepost@gmail.com

The project is funded by Sutton Coldfield Neighbourhood Network Scheme and will enable us to further develop existing services and resources enabling greater access for businesses to become a valued local resource for the disabled. This is the start of a broader project aims with long-term partnership objectives for Sutton Coldfield.

Businesses and organisations who participate will benefit from free help and advice, be showcased in future accessibility information resources and be promoted as Disability Recognised Businesses via a range of publications and online portals.

The Queen's Jubilee 2022

In 2022, Her Majesty The Queen will become the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, seventy years of service, having acceded to the throne on the 6th February 1952.

Throughout the celebration year Her Majesty and members of the Royal Family will travel around the Country to undertake a variety of engagements to mark this historic occasion.

The focal point of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations will be the Jubilee Weekend in June 2022.

There will be an extended bank holiday from Thursday 2nd June to Sunday 5th June.

This Bank Holiday Weekend will provide an opportunity for communities and people throughout the United Kingdom to come together to celebrate this historic milestone.

Thursday 2nd June

The Queen's Birthday Parade - **Trooping the Colour**. 1400 Soldiers, 200 Horses and 400 Musicians will parade from Buckingham Palace along the Mall to Horse Guards Parade.

There will be a number of Jubilee Beacons lit across the Country as well as in the Capital Cities of Commonwealth Countries.

Friday 3rd June

There will be a Service of Thanksgiving in St Pauls Cathedral.

Saturday 4th June

The Queen will attend the Derby at Epsom Downs.

Later there will be a Platinum Party at Buckingham Palace.

The BBC will produce a live concert to celebrate the most significant and joyous events in the Queen's seventy year reign.

Sunday 5th June The BIG JUBILEE LUNCH

People are invited to share friendship, food and fun with neighbours by holding local street parties.

Lunch can be big or small, with street parties, picnics, tea and cakes, barbeques.

The culmination of the Celebratory Weekend will be a Platinum Jubilee Pageant.

This will feature over 5000 people from across the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth and will be held against the backdrop of Buckingham Palace. The Pageant will feature Street Art/ Theatre / Circus/Carnival and costume.

GCSE Exam Howlers

- 1. The next great author was John Milton; Milton wrote Paradise Lost. Then when his wife died, he wrote Paradise Regained.



ICYMI The first proposal for boundary changes looks good for Banners Gate

In an earlier edition of Gatepost this year I urged residents (particularly Banners Gate residents) to take a look at the Electoral Boundaries for England website as the Boundaries Commission is rejigging the constituency boundaries for the whole country. Banners Gate has always been a rather sensitive area with regard to boundaries, being adjoined to north Birmingham. I have now quickly perused the proposals (only temporary at the moment) and it seems Banners Gate will not be set adrift outside the Sutton Coldfield constituency so far. Indeed, The Rt Hon Andrew Mitchell and Councillor Rob Pocock seem happy with the plans and have pointed out that a little scrap of land between the M6 and the River Tame in the east of the constituency has been added, rather than anything being taken away from Sutton Coldfield. The scrap of land is uninhabited but maybe they think there may be some votes from the squirrels!

Hopefully, most of you will be pleased with this outcome, if it remains permanent, some may not. Whatever your preference, you are urged again to tune into the website and leave a comment. www.boundariescommissionforengland.independent.gov.uk. Look for the heading in blue on the righthand side 'Initial proposals for the 2023 Boundary Review now published'. This should give you the link to the maps which are most interesting and easy to understand. (Hopefully we will be able to incorporate a copy of the map into Gatepost). Or simply try www.bcereviews.org.uk and pop in your postcode.

I have left a comment, as has Tony, the editor of Gatepost, so please do not leave it just to us two! The Commission is always keen to hear from the electorate, especially if it is in agreement with the plans. No doubt they get a fair amount of censure but a little praise is always appreciated – and that goes for our own lives too, don't you think? Councillor Pocock says that contact from



the electorate might ward off any proposed amendments. Of course, you might totally disagree with our remaining in the Sutton Coldfield constituency and that is your prerogative in a democracy so here is your chance to tell the appropriate body just that. I recall the commissioners were quite impressed with the responses from Banners Gate during the Local Government Boundaries Commission review a few years ago (Electoral Boundaries and Local Government Boundaries are different – I know, confusing, isn't it but that's why we need to be aware).

May sees the launch of a new FOLIO initiative - a Shared Reading group.



No matter how big or small your space is, whether it's a blank canvas or well-established, if you've got loads of experience or none whatsoever – anyone can do this, and our nature needs you. It's easy to help the nature on your doorstep.

An easy way to help nature.

We all need a safe place to live and for wildlife it's no different. One of the biggest causes of wildlife declines is a lack of suitable habitat – or the right kind of place to eat, shelter and raise a family. We can give nature a helping hand by giving it a home. Whatever the size of your outdoor space, there's something simple that you can do.

Discover how to turn your patch into paradise with wildlife gardening guru, Adrian Thomas. Try these simple tips and you can make your space work for you and give wildlife a boost too. You don't even need green-fingers to give it a go. In this feature, Adrian looks at homes sweet homes!

The hole story

It seems so simple, but providing holes is one of the easiest ways to help wildlife in your outside space. In fact, it is crucial – some animals needs holes to survive. Take

blue tits, for example. You can put out all the bird food you like, but if they don't have a suitable nesting hole, they won't have anywhere to raise the next generation.

This requirement for holes is easy to explain – it is all about safety and shelter. The world outside your back door is a jungle where creatures face all sorts of dangers, especially when they are trying to sleep, or when they have vulnerable eggs, chicks or youngsters. A hole that is just about big enough for them to squeeze through means nothing larger can reach them, and they are also well protected from anything the weather can throw at them.






How you can help

The problem is that our gardens, yards and balconies can be rather short of natural holes. Our trees are

often not old enough to have developed the nooks and crannies that wildlife craves, and we tend to patch up any holes in our buildings.

But it's so quick and simple easy to add some artificial holes in the form of nestboxes. The key thing to realise that any old hole won't do: each hole-dweller is looking for the right sized hole in

the right place. For example, small birds such as blue tits and great tits are happy in small nestboxes, while others such as swifts may need more specialist homes.



What size suits you?

Different types of nestboxes will attract different birds. Nestboxes for tits have relatively small holes (26–29mm diameter). While those for some of our more threatened garden species are bigger. House sparrows need a 32mm hole, starlings need a 45mm hole in an over-sized box, and house martins and swifts need boxes under the eaves with a clear flight line in.

Why not put up more than one box? You could put up a selection. You could also think beyond birds, too: hedgehogs and bats could also do with your help.



A few handy hints

- Bird boxes should face between north and east, to be out of the blazing sun.
- Bat boxes should be in a warmer, elevated position, with a clear flight line into them.
- Place boxes well out of reach of cats most boxes should be at least 2m (6 feet) off the ground.
- Avoid nestboxes which have a perch outside the hole or which are too shallow from the hole to the bottom of the box, both of these are invitations to nest-robbing predator

Bought or built, a nest box is brilliant!

If you like a spot of carpentry, you can knock up your own nestboxes, and we have several templates for you to follow. But if you're not Handy Andy, there are plenty you can buy, starting with our wide selection in the RSPB shop, each of which comes with a full instruction leaflet.



There's so much pleasure to be had from watching – and hearing – wildlife move into the accommodation you've provided. And with many boxes these days coming with mini-cameras so you can livestream the action, there's every chance to turn it into a full daily drama in spring.

If you come across an interesting investment opportunity via a search engine or online advert, how can you tell whether it's genuine or not? Just entering your email address and phone number on rogue investment sites could leave you facing a barrage of cold calls and unsolicited emails.

<u>In this video</u>, we explain what checks you can carry out to ensure an investment site or firm is legitimate or a clone and how to stay one step ahead of fraudsters.

Will Google's new ad rules stamp out scams?

Several of our investigations found that scammers pay to appear at the top of Google search results – often posing as genuine financial services firms and luring would-be investors with the promise of high returns.

Fake NHS Covid pass email and texts

The Pass was recently launched so that people can show their Covid vaccine or test status and is free. We show you <u>examples of the messages</u> and explain how to deal with NHS-related phishing so you don't get caught out.

Fake giveaways on Facebook

We've found social media ads for <u>fake competitions on</u> <u>Facebook</u> that are attracting thousands of interactions from users.

The hoax 'Alton Towers Breaks' and 'Center Parcs Resorts' pages claim to offer the chance to win getaways worth more than £2,000. Both scams tell users that all they need to do is 'like', 'comment' and 'sign up' in order to be entered into the giveaway.

Scams rocket by 33% during the pandemic

Fraudsters have thrived amid the uncertainty caused by lockdowns and a surge in online shopping, resulting in victims losing more than £2.3bn.

We explore which <u>categories of fraud have been growing the</u> <u>fastest</u>, which cost victims the most money, and how fraud varies across age groups and regions.

Introduction

More than 90 percent of new cars are bought on finance, according to the latest <u>Finance</u> <u>& Leasing Association statistics</u>.

Why such a big share? The benefits of leasing include fixed monthly repayments, no concerns about depreciation and the flexibility to switch to a new car at the end of the contract.

Within this market, electric car leasing is growing in popularity, with many buyers using it as a way to see if they can live with an EV on a daily basis.

This is an important consideration as we head towards the <u>2030 ban on the sale of new petrol and diesel cars</u>.

For reasons we'll outline here, leasing an electric car can be much more appealing than other finance options or buying outright. <u>Electric cars can be expensive to buy</u>, but most vehicles should be well within reach on EV finance.

Electric car financing

Spreading the large cost of a new car makes perfect sense, but you have to decide which finance deal to choose.

We're focusing on three options: personal contract purchase (PCP), hire purchase (HP) and leasing. You'll often see leasing referred to as personal contract hire (PCH), which is the consumer version of a business lease.

PCP - personal contract purchase

The basic premise of a PCP deal is that you only pay for the car's predicted depreciation

over the length of the contract.

That's the difference between the list price and the car's expected value at the end of the agreement, typically up to four years.

Most new cars lose around 40 percent of their value over the first three years. Say a new car costs £20,000 and is expected to be worth £12,000 after 36 months.

The £8,000 difference is due in the form of a small deposit and fixed monthly repayments. At the end of the contract, you can pay the remaining £12,000 or simply hand the car back.

HP - hire purchase

Before the boom in popularity of PCP deals, hire purchase (HP) was the most common form of new car finance.

An HP agreement simply involves spreading the cost of a new car over a fixed period, typically 12 months to five years. At the end of the contract, the car is yours, with nothing more to pay. However, if you are considering an EV then HP might not be the best option for you. The rate of development in the field of battery technology is such that you could find that your EV is slightly outdated and outmoded by the end of the contract.

This will make it more difficult to upgrade to a new electric car, as your trade-in value will be reduced.

Leasing

Leasing is currently the most popular option for financing an electric car - and for good reason. It's likely to be the most affordable form of EV finance, not least because you're essentially renting the car from the leasing company.

At the time of writing, it was possible to lease an electric car for less than £200 a month, with even the Nissan Leaf and Renault Zoe, two of the UK's most popular EVs, available for around this price.



Birmingham's Neighbourhood Network Schemes

What are the Neighbourhood Network Schemes?

The NNS are constituency-based networks, set up to develop community-based activities and support, and connect citizens and professionals to groups, organisations, activities, services and places in their local neighbourhoods.

They bring together voluntary organisations and community groups, social work teams, other health and social professionals and statutory agencies to support citizens and make their local neighbourhood a better place to live. They are an integral part of Birmingham City Council's strength-based community social work model.

Extending support to younger disabled adults

Currently all Neighbourhood Network Schemes across the city have a focus of adults over 50. The City Council is piloting extending the model to support younger adults with additional needs, aged 18 to 50 years, who have a long-term disability or are likely to have a care or support need in the future. In particular this will include people with autism, learning disabilities, physical disabilities, mental ill-health, and sensory loss or impairment.

The two pilot areas are Hodge Hill and Sutton Coldfield.

The focus of the NNSs is supporting community activities which help people live healthy and independent lives, staying active and connected to others in their community. The aim of the pilots is to learn about what support is needed by citizens with these additional needs, which community organisations or assets are providing support and how the NNS model will need to be adjusted to meet these needs. We are aiming to extend the NNS for a further 5 years and the plan, subject to budgetary approval, is to extend this to all areas of the City.

These are just a few examples of community based activity and services currently running across the city: an inter-generational art project for the Deaf community; discos for young adults with learning disabilities; support groups

run by and for citizens with particular disabilities; befriending and sailing for people who are blind and visually impaired; and production of a Covid-19 "soothing pack" for those suffering anxiety.

Hodge Hill and Sutton Coldfield are currently mapping community activities in their areas which support these groups of citizens. They will identify gaps and set key priorities with their Social Work teams and Constituency Steering Groups. Grant-funding and capacity building will be available to support community organisations develop activities to meet them.

We need your help!

Both NNSs would love to hear from you if you run an organisation that supports citizens with these disabilities or if you would like to do more to include them. Sutton Coldfield are keen to hear from citywide organisations looking to reach out to Sutton Coldfield residents as well as local specialist organisations.

We are also hoping to talk to citizens with disabilities to better understand what else is needed locally.

Sutton Coldfield Neighbourhood Network Scheme

We are creating a map of all of the community assets and activities in the Sutton Coldfield constituency, which can help people aged 50+ to lead independent, happy and healthy lives.

Community assets are individuals, groups or organisations who are doing something or delivering an activity, project or service in a neighbourhood setting which older people can benefit from. This can be anything from a lunch club to a line dancing class, befriending to benefits advice, or a support group to a sewing club.

As well as mapping community assets, we are also working with them to sustain and grow the activities and services they offer to citizens aged 50+ in the local area. We can offer a range of support around issues such as marketing and promotion, volunteering, governance and fundraising, and as part of this, we have a micro and small grants scheme which can fund certain activities and projects in Sutton Coldfield.

We also have opportunities for citizens aged 50+ who have experience of social isolation or are carers (looking after someone regularly because they are older, disabled or seriously ill), or who have experience of running a community based activity to get involved in developing the Neighbourhood Network Scheme in Sutton via our co-production group.

Café Oasis Update from Laura



As you know the United Reformed Church has been closed throughout the whole of lockdown which has meant that our community café has also been closed to the public. We have, however, been providing a Home Food Delivery Service to those that are isolated in the community and need a bit of extra support.

But things have changed for the better and it has been absolutely lovely to see people back in Café Oasis – conversation, laughter, friendship – all of things we have been missing. We tentatively opened our doors on 17th May – each Monday, Tuesday and Friday – with some mitigation measures in place such as one-way systems, hand sanitising stations, table service and

track and trace. We have an incredible group of Café volunteers that welcome our visitors and the team in the kitchen cook all our lovely food. It has been especially lovely to be able to bring back our kitchen volunteers – all of whom are adults with learning difficulties and special needs – and support them through all of the changes we have had to make. The amiable weather has also meant that we can place tables and chairs outside for people to enjoy their coffee and cake.

The Church itself continues with booked bi-weekly services and began to hire the rooms out again to local groups. Our Foodbank/Food4U (held each Tuesday) is still providing a much needed resource to the community – their difficult fight to end food poverty is on-going and they completely appreciate all the support and donations from the wider community.

What's next for us? We are working with Governmental COVID guidelines and restrictions and will continue to provide a much needed community oasis in the heart of Sutton Coldfield., our Home Food Delivery Service will continue, we hope within the next month to start providing a minibus transport service to people that cannot make it to the café without extra assistance – watch this space for more details regarding this.

We are always looking for volunteers that can dedicate a bit of time and as we get busier we would appreciate some help with 'front of house' duties, 'waiter/waitressing' and someone to work the 'till' – if you might be interested in this then please don't hesitate to get in contact – we are a fab bunch of people.
