Alison Jolley: Mamma Mia! Graffiti is here again. You will see from looking at the before and after photos that I have been out and about targeting graffiti all around Vesey and getting it sorted ASAP. As you know the Sutton Coldfield Town Rangers

are a fantastic resource for our Town and after a quick call they swiftly came along and put things to rights again as you can see by looking at the pictures.





Unfortunately, they are very often required to target ugly graffiti spots like this but can you imagine how scruffy and down at heel our town would be if we hadn't got this fast responding service? The Town Council launched and totally finances this service which not only targets graffiti but also clears overgrown vegetation, clears litter from our streets together with other general cleaning activities.

Clearing graffiti drains public funds, research shows Britain spends several million pounds per year repeatedly clearing it, think of all that money which could be better spent on all manner of local community initiatives and improvements. Graffiti hurts business and many people associate graffiti with general decline of an area, even if it's not true. Consequently, businesses often loose custom as the area is no longer pleasing to visit.

I have also been meeting up with local residents in Boldmere to chat about the implications of lockdown and also caring for loved ones with lifelong conditions. We spoke about dementia and the new support group meeting up together over coffee, please see the accompanying details with regards to this. A friendly welcome is assured.

Rob Pocock: According to recent research, there are now 3.5 million extra dogs in the country since the pandemic. That's an extra dog for every 8 households. Given that Gatepost covers 2,500 households in the Banners Gate and Parklands neighbourhood, then at a

guess that means 300 more dogs in the area. Dogs and other pets have helped guard people against loneliness and isolation in recent times, so from that angle all is good news.

Many new dog owners are fresh to the game, and so it's not surprising we're also getting a few problems.

To any new dog owner, a reminder – it's illegal to allow your dog to foul the pavement. If your new doggie should 'drop one' on the pavement then you should pick it up with gloves or a plastic bag and take it home with you. If there's a litter bin handy you can use this (no need to just use dog waste bins) but all in all, it's best to take all deposits back to the household.

You can let dogs off the leash in parks, but they must always be under control. Once again, it is illegal to allow dogs to roam out of control in parks. And when walking on the pavement or roadside grass verge, all dogs should be on a lead at all times.

Another troublesome issue hit my inbox over the summer period. The grass on the Lapworth Drive island, on the Parklands, had been left to grow long at the request of some residents around it. However, others of their neighbours were not impressed as the grass grew uncut and raised complaints. Fortunately, I think we have now got a compromise, with the grass cut back again now, and the options for a proper wildflower area in the middle of the island to be considered next year. All in all, the lesson seems to be, with changes of this sort, it's best for residents to come to a broad consensus on what's preferred, before the decisions are made. I guess this is called democracy!

Alison Jolley: Many thanks indeed to a vigilant resident who made contact with me only recently, regarding a large and growing heap of trash on public land in Vesey ward. Yes, it's a fact of life, an unloved location or overflowing bin area attracts the attention of other tippers and before long the heap is twice the size and three times as smelly, hence the importance of early detection and

subsequent removal.





I am glad to say I was able to have this particular stack cleared rapidly due to the rapid response of the City Council fly tipping team after my initial contact with them. Councils in England are having to pay millions of pounds a year in street cleaning to combat litter and fly tipping. This prevents finite resources reaching vital services that all communities need in order to grow and flourish. Rubbish dumping is illegal which can lead to a fine of £50,000 along with imprisonment. Birmingham City Council has a clear web page that details how to report fly tipping but do please get in touch regards to issues like this if required.

We are fortunate in Sutton that we have a vast number of residents and workers who are keen to keep our town a great place to live. Grateful thanks indeed to the many residents and also schools who organise and partake in local litter picks for dropped paper, cans etc, It makes a massive difference particularly as lockdown has seen an increase in litter amongst hedges, parkland and roads.


The end results are AMAZING! We chose a sample of final pieces and have displayed these in our new gallery. This runs the length of our main school corridor and looks stunning.

Well done to all year groups for working so hard, honing their artistic skills and expressing themselves so well.



Alert- Vehicle Crime

We have seen an increase in reports of vehicle crime in Birmingham in recent weeks. There are steps that you can take to help to protect your vehicle.

**Keyless theft**: When vehicles are stolen using an electronic device to access the signal to your key fob. You can prevent this by purchasing a signal blocker bag to store your key fob in once you have parked up <a href="https://faradaybag.com/key-shields/">https://faradaybag.com/key-shields/</a>. Alternatively you can store your keys in a foil lined tin to stop the signal being picked up by a relay tracker device that has the range to pick up signals from outside your home.

**Theft of High Value Vehicles**: When storing a vehicle in a locked and secure garage isn't possible, then secondary security measures are advisable. Criminals want to steal your vehicle as quickly as possible so putting layers of security in place will help to deter them. Consider using a Disklok <a href="https://www.disklokuk.co.uk">https://www.disklokuk.co.uk</a>/.

**Theft from vehicles**: After parking up at your destination or at home for the evening remove all valuables from your vehicle and make sure it is locked and secure. Opportunist thieves go out in the early hours trying car door handles to see what they can find. Items such as tools, sat navs, laptops phones, sunglasses and loose change are just what they are hoping to steal. So please take a minute before going to bed to check your vehicle is locked.

(if they are genuine, they should not mind waiting)

#### Streetwatch Volunteers Required

The Vesey Neighbourhood Team are looking for more volunteers to join our existing Streetwatch schemes in Boldmere and its neighbouring areas.

StreetWatch is a community led initiative which allows you to make a difference where you live.

StreetWatch groups are made up of volunteers from local communities. They carry out street patrols, but have no police powers.

Streetwatch is about local residents promoting good citizenship and supporting a better neighbourhood by patrolling their own streets. They provide visible reassurance and appropriately engage in local issues that matter most to your community.

As a Street Watch member, you will patrol your local area for at least **two** hours every month, at times which suits you.

Your local street watch co-ordinator will give you day to day support, so you know what to look out for and you will also have support from your local police.

If the group sees suspicious activity, they report it to the policing team, but do not get involved.




#### MORE MEMORIES OF SCOTLAND - A ONCE IN A LIFETIME EXPERIENCE



We had been staying in Ballater, Aberdeenshire for some years and had remained friends with Laura, a member of the Balmoral staff since first arriving in the Balmoral area. 1986 was the 100th Anniversary since Queen Victoria inspected the Black Watch Regiment at Ballater Station on her way to Balmoral Castle, built in 1866 and was the end of the line as H.M. would not permit the railway company to go through her estate to reach Braemar. To celebrate this event Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth planned to repeat this. We wished to go and watch as it promised to be something of interest.

The night before this event we received a phone call from our friend Laura. mentioned in a previous article. She had obtained permission from H.M.'s Personal Security officer for us to go to the Castle and witness a professional 'prank' which the staff and estate workers, along with Prince Charles, had contrived for the Duke & Duchess of York's arrival from honeymoon. This was to be performed within the castle grounds. Of course, we didn't hesitate as this was to be a once in a lifetime event. On arriving we were told where to park (within the grounds) hidden behind some trees and then make our way to the first cross-roads in the middle of the woodland where we joined

the Balmoral and Buckingham Palace staff already assembled. Prince Charles walked down from the Castle wearing an RAF cap back-to-front, an RAF tunic, his kilt, plus Biggles-type goggles. He mingled with the crowd awaiting the arrival of Her Majesty's car with Andrew and Sarah. The Princess of Wales arrived first, driving William and Harry (both small children) with Nanny Barbara Barnes. The Royal Car carrying the Queen and the Duke & Duchess were next to arrive and Prince Charles stood in the middle of the road, stopping the car, holding up his arms, policeman-like. He ordered the Duke & Duchess out while Her Majesty was then driven to the castle to be greeted by the Factor, the Minister, the Doctor and the Lord Lieutenant of the County after which she met with all the ghillies (gamekeepers).



The 'prank' arrived through the trees to the tune of the 'Dambuster's' March. An open truck covered with blue and white sheeting, (representing sky and clouds) and on the back a bright yellow helicopter complete with rota blades, dials etc. The couple were 'encouraged' to climb aboard. It was the most amazing sight with a red, white and blue crown on front and back, a blue flashing light on top and the words 'DUCHYYORKIE' printed on each side along with the date of their wedding. Once aboard, they donned Biggles-type helmets along with goggles and with the Queen's Piper leading the way, they were ready for the slow drive up to the castle. Both thought it great fun.

The Prince & Princess of Wales began to follow with their children, while the rest of us also followed the procession to the Castle. After alighting the Duke and Duchess were greeted by the dignitaries. At this point, the Queen, wearing a peacock blue coat and hat, suddenly knelt and kissed a corgi on its lead. (Apparently, we learned later, she had given this dog as a puppy the previous year, to the daughter of a staff member).

After all the introductions the Royal Family bade a temporary farewell to the staff assuring them they would be seeing them again throughout their stay.

We continued on our day, hardly believing the spectacle we had witnessed, the royals relaxed. This was the beginning of their holiday.



The Ballater residents also celebrated the 200th anniversary by holding a 'Victorian Week' where shopkeepers and residents donned Victorian clothes and dressed their shop windows accordingly. Bunting draped across the street and from people's houses flags flew in the breeze. Highland Nights were held on the village green and in the Victoria Hall in Station Square. During the evening we saw people strolling the streets in top hats and frock coats, the ladies wearing crinolines, creating the Victorian atmosphere. The large church on the village green held a Victorian flower festival with Victorian artefacts included. The festive atmosphere provided us with some unexpected interest to our holiday.

Unfortunately the station was destroyed by fire in the early hours of an August day in 2015, a terrible shock to the community as it was a

regular coffee shop and restaurant. In 2018 it was restored, the restoration team being led by Halliday Fraser Munro.







Banners Gate School was here when we came to live in the area, but a number of residents then, who bought their houses new, as they were built, have told us that the school had been set aside for tennis



Fraudulent celeb endorsements and fake shipping tracking

Fraudsters peddling health supplements are still using famous faces, such as Dragons' Den's Deborah Meaden, to lure victims. They create fake courier websites and sometimes even go to the extent of an elaborate customer service experience such as a fake shipping tracker to disguise the scam.

Here's what happened with a member of the public who had £198 taken from their account after purchasing a '£5 sample size CBD supplement' after clicking on an online advert for it.

#### Fake Wetherspoon meal voucher competition

Fake meal vouchers for Wetherspoon pubs are being promoted on Facebook, despite the chain shutting all its social media accounts in 2018.

Users who comment on the posts published by the pages imitating the pub chain are told that they will win meal vouchers if they receive comments from Wetherspoon. But these comments come from scammers who have set up the pages.

Here's what the posts look like and more about how the scam works.

#### HMRC scams double in a year

Tax-related scams have continued to rise during the pandemic and HMRC responded to more than 1m scam reports in the past 12 months.

Fraudsters often try to mimic HMRC's messages so they look authentic – be it through scam phone calls or fake web pages – as victims are more likely to transfer money to an institution they recognise and trust.

Here are the <u>most common ways scammers are trying to commit tax scams</u> and how to protect yourself from them.

#### Fake NHS Covid-19 PCR text

There have been several scams circulating throughout the pandemic using the NHS's name and/or logo. This time it's a fake text message demanding that you 'order a PCR testing kit'. It's made to look like you've been pinged by the NHS Covid-19 app, but is another example of fraudsters seeking to panic you into following a URL leading to a fake website.

<u>Here's what it looks like</u>, and how to differentiate between genuine and fake NHS communications.

You've been supporting our campaign work to improve consumer protection from unsafe and illegal activities occurring on major online websites, specifically, the sale of unsafe products, fake reviews or scams.

We hope that we've armed you with the knowledge and tools to help protect yourself and your loved ones. But it's important you know that it's not 100% on you to make sure you're safe online.

These harms are symptoms of one underlying cause - a lack of online consumer protections borne out of the way regulations of online businesses have evolved. This means online sites and tech giants are failing to protect you from online scams, dangerous products and fake reviews.

We'll break down the puzzle, explaining each issue and how it all comes together to big tech firms needing to take responsibility for your online safety.

#### **Product safety**

Our latest investigation into the sale of unsafe products on eBay, Wish.com and AliExpress found listings of diet pills and supplements containing substances that could be



potentially dangerous. We found little evidence to suggest measures to prevent items from being listed were effective, or that marketplaces were monitoring and responding quickly enough to new postings.

Here are our calls for action against unsafe products.

#### **Fake reviews**

Fake online reviews are influencing people across the UK into purchasing billions of pounds worth of products and services every year. Our research showed three in ten of us have bought products off the back of 'excellent' online customer reviews only to be chronically let down when they arrived.

We think tech giants are more than capable of enforcing their own policies to detect and prevent misleading reviews.

#### Scam alert service

More than £355m lost to bank transfer scams in the first half of 2021.

Of the £355.3m lost to bank transfer scams in the first half of the year, just £121.7m was reimbursed to victims – just 42.4% of the overall losses. Not only is more money being lost, but less money is being repaid to fraud victims.

UK Finance says fraud is 'now at a level where it poses a national security threat', and is calling on the government for coordinated action, and to ensure that all economic crime is brought within the scope of the Online Safety Bill.

We look at the scale of the problem and what safeguards you have to stop you from falling victim to scammers.

#### Tackling the ongoing 'scamdemic'

Text scams are at their highest rate on record and over a 90-day period from May to July 2021, 53% of texts reported to the 7726 service - a free text service that enables you to report spam texts - were fake parcel delivery messages and 37% impersonated banks.



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

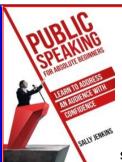
