Birmingham Weekly COVID-19 Statistics

This week, the total number of cases identified in Birmingham was 4,237 cases, compared to 3,714

cases reported in the previous week, an increase of 14.1%.

The 10 wards with the highest case rates (cases per 100,000 population) this week are:

- Sutton Roughley (997.3)
- Sutton Four Oaks (746.4)
- Sutton Walmley & Minworth (727.7)
- Sutton Trinity (679.4)

- Billesley (537.9)
- Quinton (533.2)

Compared to previous week, cases increased in all age groups this week, except 80+, which decreased by 13%. The 60-79 age group showed the largest increase of 33%, followed by an increase of 28% in the 20-39 age group, 13% in 40-59, and 11% in 0-19.

Cases increased in all ethnic groups this week. The Black ethnic group showed the largest increase of 75%, followed by an increase of

any boy in the road who was unfortunate to have an Apache outfit for his Christmas, no Apache's in our road left by Boxing day.





Finally, a very merry Christmas to you all, and a huge thanks to editor and compiler Tony Willis. He works tirelessly to produce this very informative





Hope Food North Birmingham's Countdown to Christmas Appeal launched last week and the charity is looking to raise £500 or specific festive food items to be donated in the lead up to Christmas.

'Winter is such an important time for food banks and never more so than in 2021.' said Deb Middleton, Trustee and lead co-ordinator for Hope Food North Birmingham. 'The number of people visiting food banks increases in winter as a result of a family, or individuals, financial resources becoming more stretched due to increased household costs such as fuel and lighting'. 'And the uncertainty that the pandemic created is an added concern this Winter. We are currently helping on average 230 adults and children each week and we have only been running 5 months so haven't experienced our first winter yet'.

In the run up to Christmas, Hope Food North Birmingham will be asking for individuals, groups, schools, businesses and churches to donate festive themed items that will be passed onto families in need. Items such as: Mince pies and Christmas cake - Festive biscuits and chocolates - Toiletry gift packs for both men and women.

Deb explains 'We hand out food bags that provide around 1 – 2 days worth of meals – so there is something for breakfast, (cereal and long life milk), something for lunch, (baked beans or tinned meat), something for dinner, (pasta and pasta sauce), and something sweet (biscuits). When combined with the fresh fruit, vegetables and bread that visitors to our Hope Food food bank days receive, it really does give a good boost to an individuals or families weekly diet. This really is the basics so in the lead up to Christmas we would like to hand out festive items to add a little bit of cheer to help people celebrate Christmas. What we would really, really like to do is to actually give out an extra parcel containing meat, cheese, eggs and milk - things we rarely get to hand out. Things that actually most of us take for granted when we do our weekly shops.'

Hope Food has a number of drop off points around Sutton Coldfield for individual or small collections of food. These can be found on Hope Food North Birmingham's Facebook and Instagram pages. Rob's Mum's 1950's home-made Christmas cake recipe.





Brussel Sprout Christmas Coleslaw

½ kg clean raw Brussel sprouts
50 gms Parmesan cheese shavings
40gms sliced toasted almonds
40 gms dried cranberries or cherries (chopped)
8 tbs M & S honey and mustard dressing

Method.

Wash and dry the sprouts.
Then slice them very thinly before chopping them up a bit more.
Add the rest of the ingredients and stir well.
Store in the fridge.

The coleslaw will keep for 2-3 days.

Brandy Butter.

	Metric	Imperial
Unsalted butter	100 gms	4 ozs
Icing sugar	100 gms	4 ozs
Caster sugar	100 gms	4 ozs
Milk	15 ml	1 tblspn
Brandy	30 ml	2 tblspns
Ground almonds	50 gms	2 ozs

Finely grated rind of a small orange (optional)

Beat the butter until soft and creamy

Beat in the sugar alternatively with a little milk and brandy

Mix until fluffy

Stir in the almonds and orange rind.

Can be frozen (thaw for 2-3 hours and then beat to a smooth sauce).

8 oz S R flour

½ teaspoon salt



Drain some juice from pineapple.


Empty pineapple into large saucepan with margarine, sugar, mixed fruit, mixed spice and bicarb.

Bring to boil, stirring, and simmer for 3 mins. Leave to cool for about 1 hour.


Add eggs, salt and flour and mix thoroughly.

Grease and line 8"square or round cake tin, bake in oven (Gas mk. 3 or 150 deg. electric) for about 1 hour.

Test with skewer to confirm cooked through.

COAL CONSUMPTION AFFECT-ING CLIMATE.

The furnaces of the world are now burning about 2,000,000,000 tons of coal a year. When this is burned, uniting with oxygen, it adds about 7,000,000,000 tons of carbon dioxide to the atmosphere yearly. 

of struggling species around. For example, white-tailed eagles have moved from the Red List to the Amber List thanks to conservation efforts made possible by supporters like you.

Saving nature together

We know that together we can make a real difference and thanks to your support we're working hard to protect struggling species such as puffins and swifts.

We also know that many of you will be keen to take action yourselves. One way you can help is by putting up a swift nest box, ready for when these migrant birds return in spring. With nesting sites in short supply, providing a much-needed home could make a big difference.

Over-70s should not be penalised for running red lights, experts say

Older drivers should be spared prosecution if they run red lights, drive too slowly or go in the wrong motorway lane, a government-funded road safety report has recommended.

The Older Drivers Task Force says assessments of driving skills should be offered to all <u>motorists</u> <u>aged 70 and above</u> in the UK who are caught committing offences – instead of facing legal penalties.



Fitness to Drive evaluations are currently only run by a handful of police forces, such as Hampshire Constabulary. Drivers' abilities are assessed by specially qualified occupational therapists and driving instructors.

If a driver is found unfit to get behind the wheel, the Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency (DVLA) is notified, and considers whether or not to remove their licence. In some instances, drivers are referred for more lessons and offered a reassessment within three months.

Those offered an assessment as the first port of call for careless driving, or driving without due care and attention, would then avoid the

usual £100 fine and three penalty points for this offence.

The report highlighted that rolling out Fitness to Drive assessments nationally would help to reduce deaths and serious injuries among older drivers. It said the government should aim to halve the number of car crash deaths in over-70s by 2030.

Steve Gooding, director of the RAC Foundation, said: "Allowing older drivers to remain mobile is critical to their mental and physical wellbeing, but so is safety.

"A system which helps people address their shortcomings rather than simply penalises them could help maintain this balance."

Mr Gooding pointed out that most older drivers are very safe and self-regulate their driving, avoiding travelling at night or during rush hour, for example.

He added: "But any encouragement we can all be given to reassess our ability to drive safely should be welcomed, not just after an incident but throughout our driving lives."

Other recommendations made by the Older Drivers Task Force include mandatory <u>sight tests</u> at licence renewals from the age of 70, a programme to make T junctions safer and research into the causes of pedal confusion.

The Task Force report states that older drivers do not pose a "significant risk" to other road users but their "relative frailty" means they are over-represented in serious crashes.

There are 5.7 million people in the UK aged 70 and over with a full driving licence, including 489 who are at least 100, latest Department for Transport (DfT) figures show.

Annual car driver fatalities among the 70-79 age group are forecast to surge by 40% over the next 20 years due to the country's ageing population.

The Task Force was led by the Road Safety Foundation (RSF) which published the report. Dr Suzy Charman, its executive director said: "We want to increase the pace of progress to ensure that we do not see the expected rise in the number of older drivers killed or seriously injured in road crashes.

"Key recommendations such as introducing mandatory eye tests at licence renewal at age 70 are considered essential and lifesaving.

"We hope the Department for Transport welcomes the report and can provide the leadership necessary to ensure these recommendations are taken forward.

"Not only will this make driving safer for older drivers, but it will also provide a legacy of safer roads for generations to come."

A Department for Transport spokesperson said: "Safety remains our top priority and we will continue to ensure we strike the right balance between keeping the roads safe and maintaining people's personal mobility into old age.

"We keep all measures under review and will consider the wider outcomes of this report."

A dedicated phone number for anti-fraud checks could be effective because it allows you to check whether a call from your bank is genuine. But will banks use this to justify even lower reimbursement rates?
