Alison Jolley: **Frozen in Time** Curling on a frozen pool in Sutton Park around 1890!



This fascinating photograph by Sir Benjamin Stone shows at least two individuals wearing ice skates, suggesting that the park pools regularly iced over during winter months. National winter records of 1890 show exceptionally cold months that lasted from the end of November 1890 to late January 1891 with rivers, lakes and pools thick

with ice.

Benjamin Stone was a prominent national figure who lived at The Grange In Erdington, the same building which was to become the well-known John Taylor Hospice. He was a local Conservative politician and a Birmingham MP for over ten years. Prior to this he was the first Mayor of Sutton Coldfield, a post he held for over four vears.

Stone was a prolific photographer and wrote of his role in life as being, "to portray for the benefit of future generations, the manners and customs, the festivals and pageants, the historic places of our times." He certainly did achieve many things, by the end of his life he had taken 26,000 photographs which are of course, of huge interest

Rob Pocock: QUAD BIKES ON THE RAMPAGE AGAIN

It's been going on periodically for some years, but it seems a new surge of quad bikes and motorcycle 'scrambling' has sprung up again since the New Year. The main areas

affected recently are the Greenway, and to a lesser extent the King George VI Playing Fields. The local Sutton Vesey Neighbourhood Police have been patrolling, with our sergeant Zulf Ali. However, they can't be there 24/7 and so the culprits are still getting away with it. I'm checking with the City Council Parks Department as to whether there can be improvements to fencing and barriers, as the main offenders appear to be getting onto the Greenway from the Kingstanding end. There are funds available for this sort of thing, but the main issue is whether a suitable form of added fencing is feasible given that grass mowers and litter collector vehicles also still have to be able to get onto these sites.

While on the subject of King George VI Playing Fields, we need to be alert to the possibility of the Family Funfair that came last summer, may want to return this summer. We don't want to be caught unawares as happened last year, so anyone with views on this possibility please email me your opinions either way, to rob.pocock@birmingham.gov.uk.

SPEEDING TRAFFIC LATEST

I'm glad to report that the City Highways department has accepted the request, made by Kath Scott and myself on behalf of residents, for a reduction in traffic speeds on Chester Road North in the vicinity of the school crossing patrol between Honiley Drive and the pathway to New Oscott school down Avery Road. This will go down from 40 to 30mph. The Highways people are doing the legal consultations as I write, and hopefully it will be agreed and in force within the current financial year. At the same time, the tatty wooden fencing beside the pathway to Avery Road has been removed and will be replaced with a proper and secure set of

metal safety rails, like the ones at road crossings. This will remove a tacky eyesore and make it safer too. That's more welcome good news!

Last week St Columba's Church had a visit from The Bishop of Birmingham. It was a wonderful way to start 2022. Whilst with us Bishop David preached on John 2: 1-11, which tells of Jesus's first miracle, when Jesus was at a wedding with his family and turned water into wine.



(The bishop assured us that he would have known that he was at a party and that it wasn't a 'Bring Your Own Bottle' occasion either!)

As the wedding celebrations continued the supply of wine began to run dry, not only a cause for concern for the party goers but also a problem for the host. A wedding where the supplies ran out would be seen as very bad form and a slight not easily forgotten.



Into the spotlight steps Jesus who starts his ministry by turning water into wine. Not just any old wine, very good wine, and lots of it too. It's estimated that about 150 gallons of wine were produced, for a visual learner that is about 3 wheelie bins full! All that wine, saved till last.

On the surface it may seem to be an odd miracle to begin a world changing ministry with, BUT Jesus was pronouncing something about the Kingdom of Heaven. Things were on the move, life would be changed, and this new way of living would involve love, celebration, generosity, and abundance.

Now, those words may be hard to hear or to accept in our current climate. 2022 has already bought challenges. Celebration and abundance might not be the first things that spring to mind as we face

At the gap* we exist to engage, identify and invest in the lives of marginalised young people in Sutton Coldfield and surrounding areas. We look to step into the gap between exclusion and acceptance, between apathy and hope. We seek to demonstrate that actions really do speak louder than words!

Our mission statement at the gap* as a Christian charity is to be committed to improving opportunities for excluded and marginalised young people by helping them develop their skills and abilities irrespective of their circumstances, backgrounds or situations.

Two of our main projects at the moment include Venue and HeadSpace. Venue is our drop-in and is the major point of contact with the young people in the area. We

are open three times a week – Monday, Wednesday and Friday 15.30-17.30pm. It is a safe space for young people to chill, relax, hang-out with friends, meet new people or just get a free hot chocolate. The Venue drop-in offers a pool table, Xbox One, air hockey table and a listening ear. These weekly sessions allow for relationships to be built through conversations. These in turn provide a way for us to work more specifically with individuals that need help in changing behaviours, moving forward through education, dealing with personal issues and obstacles they may be facing.

We also have the HeadSpace project which was set up in 2015 as a result of recognising a growing need to support young people experiencing issues and difficulties with their mental and emotional well-being. We aspire to work with young people between the ages of 11-22 as we believe there is limited support available for this age group, particularly those transitioning into adulthood. HeadSpace is currently working in a number of secondary schools in and around the Sutton Coldfield area, offering one-to-one sessions with students. This space gives young people the opportunity to share and explore any thoughts or feelings, to get advice and guidance or to just be alone with their thoughts. In addition to working in secondary schools, we also work independently with individual students and young people, meeting in a safe neutral environment. HeadSpace works via a group of staff and volunteers who are trained in up to Level 3 in Mentoring practice. Our other projects include Out There, our detached street work, and Studio, for the musically minded!

At the gap* we work underground meeting the needs of the young people we come into contact with, we are ever changing and ever growing. Message for Sgt Ali and the Vesey team please.

Thank you for your contact call several weeks ago, Sergeant Ali, following the Community Safety meeting held in Boldmere and attended by Simon Foster the PCC and local Councillors.

The problem of youths riding unregistered scrambler style motor cycles in Sutton Park and along Chester Road onto Banners Gate Road and The Greenway continues to cause great concern to local residents. The riders have no regard for the law or indeed personal safety. Whilst the machines churn up the beautiful open space of Sutton Park and The Greenway, causing extensive damage to the grassed area, they also ride at speeds in excess of 40mph along the pathway of the North Birmingham Cycle route.

Their illegal actions of course are now becoming so dangerous that it is the potential death of an innocent cyclist or dog walking pedestrian or child playing ball games, waiting to happen. Some of the motor cyclists are even riding at speed towards pedestrians in a threatening manner, and at the last moment, veering their machines away. They think this action is great fun and video footage is available by at least one resident of this dangerous practice.

Sergeant Ali did call me to discuss my concerns raised at the Community Safety meeting and stated he would call me again, once he had the opportunity to fully investigate the problem. I await that call.

I have a video recording the illegal motorcyclists, as indeed have many other residents, and we now feel that action must be taken immediately to prevent a death occurring. The youths, numbering as many as five riders use the Greenway at various times of the day and various days of the week, but appear from my own observations to use the Park and Greenway every Saturday afternoon for the last four Saturday's, and even when the ground has been covered in ice or heavy frost, making their threatening actions even more dangerous to public users.

It seems that the riders all reside in the Kingstanding area and in close proximity to Kings Road and Tottenham Crescent, but their exact addresses are currently unknown to me. None of the machines bear registration plates, and the riders wear no helmets, but mainly conceal their faces by wearing black balaclavas.

The evidence of damage caused to both the grassed areas and tarmac cycle route is now considerable and plain to see, and is becoming worse each time the area is used like a grass track meeting. The activities continue even in the dark and sometimes with machines with no lighting.

Perhaps Sergeant Ali or a member of the Vesey Neighbourhood team could contact me to update me on their enquiries to help prevent this illegal action, and take action to help prevent a possible death occurring. I am aware that one of the illegal motor cyclists was killed on Monmouth Drive in Oct/ Nov which unfortunately also involved an innocent motorist using that road.

I look forward to your response.

What Hope

What a year it's been!

Hope Food North Birmingham was established at the end of May last year and NORTH BIRMINGHAM has only been up and running for just over seven months.

During this time Hope Food has:

* Run 93 weekly Hope Food banks events in Falcon Lodge, Mere Green and Erdington

*Supported over 6700 adults and children access fresh fruit, vegetables, bread and long life food

* Made 140 hostel drops at night supplying over 1,000 crates of food that was within hours of expiring to support the border-line homeless and most vulnerable members of our community.

* Provided 922 food crates to 14 other foodbanks and organisations which support those suffering from food poverty.

*Over 60 active volunteers provide over 200 hours of time each week to make sure the charity runs and supports the most vulnerable of our local community – that's equivalent to 6 full time employees. And this doesn't include a lot of ad hoc work and support these and other volunteers give.

Deb Middleton, lead co-ordinator and Trustee of Hope Food said 'On behalf of the trustees we would like to say a huge thank you to all the volunteers for their tireless efforts, and to members of the public. schools, businesses and organizations who have donated either financially or with food to make all of this possible throughout the past seven months and in our Christmas Appeal. We couldn't have done it without you. Here's to the next twelve months!'

Parking enforcement operators have sparked fury after insisting that fines should be increased to £120 – the equivalent of almost two days' pay for a key worker on the minimum wage. The British Parking Association (BPA), which represents traffic management firms, is calling for the current maximum charge of £100 for parking illegally to be raised to £120. However, this at odds with plans from the Government.

Ministers are proposing to reduce the maximum parking fine to £50, but this

has caused concern for BPA leaders, who fear this would make drivers more likely to ignore the rules and lead to millions more fines being dished out.

A £50 fine would be discounted to £25 if paid within 14 days, which the BPA says will encourage some drivers to just to pay the fine and not worry about breaking parking rules.

The BPA's chief executive Andrew Pester said: "We are calling on the Government to reconsider its proposal to reduce the level of parking charge and to further engage with landowners and parking operators to ensure a sufficient deterrent, which is effective and improves compliance with parking rules."

But critics have pointed out that it would take someone on £8.91-an-hour minimum wage contract two days to pay off a £120 ticket, even if they work full time, the Daily Mail reports.

RAC head of roads policy Nicholas Lyes said: "No driver ever tries to get a parking charge notice, so the idea a lower penalty cap will mean more fines being dished out is baseless. The majority simply want to park, abide by the rules, do their business and leave the car park without incident.

"If drivers are flagrantly breaching terms and conditions, then it's right they suffer the consequences, but parking operators should always be following the standards set out. If a driver feels they've been treated unfairly then they should appeal, and ideally their case should be reviewed by a single, independent appeals system which will hopefully be part of the new Parking Code of Practice due later this year."

The BPA's call comes after the PA news agency revealed earlier this week that private parking firms issued more than 22,000 tickets to drivers every day in the first six months of the 2021/22 financial year.

Separate research from the RAC Foundation in November found that the number of private parking firms issuing tickets to drivers has increased by nearly two-thirds in just five years.

The Government has pledged a crackdown on 'cowboy' firms with a new Code of Practice for the private parking industry.

The proposed legislation is still awaiting ministerial sign-off, but it aims to clamp down on some of the ruthless firms that run thousands of car parks at hospitals, shopping centres and train stations.
