Rob Pocock: BOTHERSOME BINS AGAIN

It seems bin collections are never very far away from my job as a Vesey Ward Councillor and the period since Christmas has been no exception! It took a while for

the service to recover from the Christmas period when there was a planned gap in the service on the Mondays which were public bank holidays in lieu of Christmas Day and New Year's Day, which fell on weekends this year. Then there was the winter Omicron Covid wave which took a lot of crewmen out of action into January, with more services therefore missed. Then just recently, as the green waste service started up again at the end of February, there has been a wave of drivers quitting the dustcarts for better paid work on HGV freight lorries and home delivery trucks, which are 'snaffling' trained drivers from other services including Council bin drivers.

This has left the City Council service 17 drivers short, meaning 17 trucks have often simply been off the road. Normally the Council can plug the gap of staff leaving through hiring agency staff, but the same problem has affected them, so the Agencies are no longer supplying the Council with top-up drivers. The Council has been doing its own recruitment and training, it's quite a long job to complete the training and HGV2 qualifications, but five newly trained drivers started this week, and hopefully the whole block of 17

'missing' drivers will be replaced very soon. There seems to be a never-ending series of problems with the service but hopefully the latest recruitment steps should help. What we desperately do NOT need, is another spring Covid wave again!

MOBILE TIP TRUCKS ARE COMING BACK

One angle of the City Council's refuse service which has taken a positive turn, is the introduction of the 'mobile tip trucks' which are now turning up every few weeks at sites across the Sutton Vesey ward. The one held at Welshman's Hill before Christmas was very popular and the next truck visit is also coming to the Banners Gate area shortly. It will park up on Reay Nadin Drive in April – if you want advance notice when the date is fixed just drop me an email to rob.pocock@birmingham.gov.uk and I'll let you know when I know!

Finally, a reminder that any family facing challenges can now be supported through the Family Connect Scheme.

BCP has set up a voluntary sector Locality Lead and multi-agency staff from a range of services. The ten Locality Leads have close relationships with partners and communities, so they can help the whole family.

For example: provide family support, give advice and guidance including linking to food banks, connect families to the professionals

who can support them and coordinate the help, support early help assessments, connect families into the local community resources to help families to be more resilient, and give small grants for emergency food assistance.

The Queen's Jubilee 2022

Throughout the celebration year Her Majesty and members of the Royal Family will travel around the Country to undertake a variety of engagements to mark this historic occasion.

The focal point of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations will be the Jubilee Weekend in June 2022.

There will be an extended bank holiday from Thursday 2nd June to Sunday 5th June.

This Bank Holiday Weekend will provide an opportunity for communities and people throughout the United Kingdom to come together to celebrate this historic milestone.

Thursday 2nd June

The Queen's Birthday Parade - **Trooping the Colour.** 1400 Soldiers, 200 Horses and 400 Musicians will parade from Buckingham Palace along the Mall to Horse Guards Parade.

There will be a number of Jubilee Beacons lit across the Country as well as in the Capital Cities of Commonwealth Countries.

Friday 3rd June

There will be a Service of Thanksgiving in St Pauls Cathedral.

Saturday 4th June

The Queen will attend the Derby at Epsom Downs.

Later there will be a Platinum Party at Buckingham Palace.

The BBC will produce a live concert to celebrate the most significant and joyous events in the Queen's seventy year reign.

Sunday 5th June The BIG JUBILEE LUNCH

People are invited to share friendship, food and fun with neighbours by holding local street parties.

Lunch can be big or small, with street parties, picnics, tea and cakes, barbeques.

The culmination of the Celebratory Weekend will be a Platinum Jubilee Pageant.

This will feature over 5000 people from across the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth and will be held against the backdrop of Buckingham Palace. The Pageant will feature Street Art/ Theatre / Circus/Carnival and costume.

I hope everyone in our Royal Town will get involved and start planning now for this wonderful occasion.

Like many, I was very moved by a conversation I saw replayed on Twitter between, Ros Atkins and Lyse Doucet, both BBC correspondents who are reporting on the current war in Ukraine. Lyse responded to a question Ross asked about the golden dome that appears in the background as she continues to report from Ukraine.

"Ah yes, Lyse replied, "isn't it beautiful? It's St Sophias, where the bells ring out. When we used to have another position, it was St Michaels Cathedral, absolutely beautiful.

And before the invasion these glittering domes used to be golden and they lit up the night in this city. But I have to tell you, the bells of St Michaels still chime on the hour, the bells a reassuring, on the clock, message across this city that all that is not lost and that perhaps someday this country will resume its rhythms and rituals.

Every time I hear the bells of St Michael it reminds me of another time, and it sends a message right across this country. Because across this country, the monasteries that are still standing, the bells, the bells they toll for Ukraine."

In the last issue of Gate Post, I was able to let you all know about the route for the Triathlon, the designated walking routes from train stations for spectators and a general overview. In this month's issue, I'm able to give you a bit more information. As you will see from the graphic, the Triathlon takes place on Friday 29th July and Sunday 31st July. The triathletes will also be out cycling the route for familiarisation on Wednesday 27th July and Saturday 30th July. There will be 2,000 ticketed spectators at Boldmere Gate on each of the Triathlon days and an estimated 20-30,000 non-ticketed spectators, most of whom will be around the cycling route.

If you've not seen a Triathlon before, then the graphic below will help to understand

what each athlete will endure:

Elite Men	Swim 750m, Cycle 20km, Run 5km
Elite Women	Swim 750m, Cycle 20km, Run 5km
Para Triathlon – Men and Women	Swim 750m, Cycle 20km, Run 5km
Mixed Team Relay	Swim 300m, Cycle 5km, Run 2km by each team member

The mixed team

relay is expected to be a particularly spectacular event with elite men, women and visually impaired men and women forming a team of 4. For the cycling route, each of the 4 athletes will complete one 5km circuit around the streets of Boldmere.

This once in a lifetime event where Boldmere is on the world stage will inevitably cause some disruption. I can now share with you an overview of roads that will be affected by road closures and other restrictions.



All roads on the Triathlon route will be closed. In addition to this, the roads highlighted in red will also be closed:

All residents in these roads will be contacted and given details of how to apply for a permit to exit their road before and after the events. Emergency services will still have access and registered carers will be able to gain access by showing their ID. Residents will need to apply for permits for non-registered carers.

The roads marked in blue will have a similar permit scheme in place and the roads marked in orange will

have a no stopping restriction in place:

There will be a diversion that runs from the Chester Road North at Banners Gate, along Chester Road, then Birmingham Road at The Yenton, through to Jockey Road at The Horse and Jockey. As locals, you will of course be able to work out some of the quicker routes that avoid the junctions at Chester Road Baptist Church and The Yenton, or you'll be leaving your car on the drive and enjoying the fun of the Triathlon.

In future updates, I'd like to let you know about exciting projects that will be delivered through Commonwealth Games funding, details of how you can brighten up your front gardens to celebrate the Commonwealth Games, the Queen's Baton Relay and further details relating to times and restrictions for those affected by road closures.

Work has started on <u>Sutton Coldfield Charitable Trust's</u> almshouses, which are undergoing an £850,000 refurbishment to upgrade bathrooms and kitchens.



The almshouses, which are a mix of bungalows and flats, are located at Lingard House in Walmley, Sutton Coldfield and are designed for older people, currently housing 52 residents.

The two-year project, which has been fully funded by the Trust, will see the refurbishment of 24 homes completed by the end of June. The second phase of renovation of 22 homes will start in 2023.

Shakespeare in Sutton - FOLIO's fun festival for all

Shakespeare in Sutton - FOLIO's fun festival for all Sutton Coldfield residents will get a rare opportunity to see a world treasure, first-hand and on their doorstep as part of a special arts festival in April 2022: FOLIO Sutton Coldfield will be hosting an event in Sutton Coldfield Library to see an original Shakespeare First Folio, and one that belongs to the people of Birmingham, the first collected works of William Shakespeare, published 399 years ago. Appropriately, this takes place on the Bard's birthday, April 23!

This is just one of more than 20 events in 9 different venues around the town across April as part of Shakespeare in Sutton, FOLIO's fun festival for all (https://shakespeareinsutton.org.uk/). WIth film showings and the chance to meet Falstaff, music performances and a newly commissioned map of Sutton in the time of Shakespeare, spoken word and street theatre, community group collaborations, costumes, competitions, local history events and online literature talks there really is something for everyone.

Booking is now open for all events and activities (9 -30 April) which require booking (some events are drop-in). Over 400 free tickets for different events were booked in the first weekend after publishing the full programme.

Shakespeare's First Folio is being displayed thanks to FOLIO's collaboration with the 'Everything to

Everybody' Project, an ambitious celebration of one of the UK's most important cultural assets: the vast Shakespeare Memorial Library housed within the Library of Birmingham.

Birmingham's copy of the First Folio is unique because it is the only one bought with the aim of

improving people's lives through culture and education. It was purchased in 1881 for all the people of Birmingham - no matter their background, wealth or occupation and with the First Folio Tour the Everything to Everybody project wants to take this resource to as many people as possible. The First Folio's first outing is to Sutton Coldfield Library. It is then touring across Birmingham over the next two years with stops at a range of locations including the Black Country Living Museum, Sense Touchbase Pears, Selly Manor, Highbury Hall, Gap Arts and The Hive in the Jewellery Quarter. The Folio will visit more locations in 2023.

In order to ensure as many people as possible can view the Folio, which will be open on the page of Henry IV part 1 which mentions Sutton Coldfield, people are advised to book a timed slot to visit Sutton Coldfield Library on April 23. That day will also see historical dance and music performances, a family puppet making session, a display of costumes from the Royal Shakespeare Company and other activities suitable for all ages to have fun with Shakespeare.

The streets of Sutton will also be coming to life on April 23 with walking performances, full of surprises, of the specially commission 'Shakespeare Undone' but the Natural Theatre Company.

FOLIO's festival kicks off on April 9 with creative writing and spoken word performance workshops in Sutton Coldfield Library, with participants able to take open mic slots at Mouthpieces, a spoken word special in Highbury Theatre, on April 29, with headliners including Jemima Hughes and Dreadlock Alien.

A brand new map of Sutton in the time of Shakespeare by Sutton Coldfield born children's book illustrator John Shelley will be on display in the Gracechurch Centre, whilst local expert Dr Mike Hodder will give a talk (Holy Trinity Church, April 20) and a guided walk (meeting at Vesey Gardens, April 30) on the same topic.

Shakespeare experts Dr Simon May and Ella May McGrail will be giving online talks about different aspects of the plays of the greatest writer in English. Local theatre groups The Highbury Players and Raw Talent Youth Theatre will be performing their own takes on the bard. Sutton Coldfield Movie Maker's brand new feature film, Falstaff - a Naughty Knight in Sutton Coldfield - will receive its premier during the festival.

Liz Parry, FOLIO Trustee, said: "Although the main focus is Sutton library, one of the lovely things about the festival is that events are happening in several different places, giving people an opportunity to see parts of our town that they may not have visited before."

Jenny Wilkinson, FOLIO Trustee said: "I am particularly excited by the wide range of different activities we have on offer - written and spoken word, art, music, dance, drama. There really is something for everyone."

Noran FLynn, FOLIO Trustee said: "The Shakespeare festival is bringing a range of exciting activities to Sutton Coldfield that will be accessible to everyone. It is amazing to think our town featured in Shakespeare's writings and that we are now celebrating that in 2022!"

Scammers have exploited our fear and confusion, whether by impersonating the government to offer fake Covid-19 grants, setting up fake NHS websites to steal card details, or posing as delivery companies to target online shoppers.

We reveal what the latest data from Action Fraud tells us about fraudsters' tactics and the 12 emerging threats we all need to watch out for.

A WhatsApp message asked for money, but it was a scam

One parent was conned out of £3,600 in the WhatsApp impersonation scam. Even after several weeks spent investigating, their bank initially refused to refund them. But we thought that shouldn't be the end of the matter.

This story shows what a lottery the reimbursement process can be for scam victims, even with the voluntary code designed to protect them. We also explain how to get your money backfrom your bank if you've been deceived.



Fake Currys emails

Two emails purporting to have been sent by Currys have been confirmed as fakes by the retailer. As wonderful as it would be, Currys isn't offering you a £500 voucher or a free Dyson V11 to 'reward your feedback'.

Rather, it's an attempt to send you through to third-party sites that will likely eventually request sensitive information. Here's what they look like.

Royal Mail chatbox scam

Scammers have stepped up a gear in what is a new twist on delivery scams where the perpetrators create fake chatbots that sneakily sign victims up for expensive monthly subscriptions. It starts by sending phishing emails impersonating Royal Mail that invite you to 'start a chat' to trace or reschedule a delivery.

The fake Royal Mail chatbot is plausible as it lists a delivery tracking number and shares an image of a parcel, explaining that the 'label was damaged', to convince you to reschedule the delivery.
