Rob Pocock: MONMOUTH DRIVE ISLAND AT STONEHOUSE ROAD JUNCTION

Banners Gate and Parklands residents will be familiar with the regular appearance of road crash damage on

this traffic island. It was hit twice by traffic going

west (out of Sutton) earlier in the year, and then again a few weeks ago with a car going eastbound (towards Sutton). This latest car was being driven at speed by a driver without tax or insurance, under the heavy influence of intoxication. It mounted the island, bounced off, crashed through the safety bollards that we had got installed just weeks earlier, ploughed through the nearby resident's hedge and then skidded 30 yards across his lawn, stopping just feet away from his house. The driver staggered out, wandered off and disappeared, still not yet traced it seems.

Better signs and speed limits will not stop total idiots of this kind. We are looking at stronger physical barriers to protect this vulnerable property. However, other accidents have happened with drivers apparently not seeing the island properly. It seems pretty high profile to me, but nevertheless we are talking to the City Highways department about better signage, including a bolder 'chevron' sign on the actual stonework of the island itself. If you approach the island now from the Banners Gate end, you can iust about make out a battered and faded 'chevron' stuck on the side of the island – this is one of the things we want to get renewed so at least any lawabiding driver has no excuse. Other signage improvements are also being considered. There is no accounting for the behaviour of complete lunatics, but for the rest of our community this should be a helpful local improvement.

ROADS AND PAVEMENTS

While on the subject of roads and highways, we are getting to the time of year when Kath and I are asked by the highways contractors, Kier Highways, to feed in our views on outstanding improvements needed. We have already lodged the part of Westwood Rd from Reay Nadin up to George Frederisk Rd requesting re-surfacing, and the pavements on Longmoor Rd and Hollyhurst Rd. Any other suggestions just email me on rob.pocock@birmingham.gov.uk. We don't get to make the decisions ourselves but at least we can make sure that residents' views are made known to the people who do decide.

In recent decades we have all become increasingly aware of the crucial importance of our relationship with nature and the damage global warming is doing to our world.

We cannot replace a melted ice cap or return vast areas of the rain forest to its former glory, however there is much that can be done either individually or through an organisation to help lessen the impact that climate change is causing globally, both at home and abroad. International news shows the poorest countries and their peoples are the hardest hit, in response to these facts the church as a whole launched Eco Church, a national environment programme in order to track and most importantly address its own carbon emissions.

So how is St Columba's fitting in with all of this and performing a vital role within the Banners Gate locality? After all schools, businesses, families and a whole raft of voluntary organisations are continually working hard to reduce, reuse, recycle on a daily basis throughout Sutton and beyond. Just a few examples are:

- 1. Ongoing involvement with the A Rocha UK Eco Church programme which actively supports the reduction of our carbon footprint. Nationally over 5,000 churches are involved and this number is growing rapidly.
- 2. Effective recycling facilities for plastic, glass and paper for all Church users
- 3. LED lighting throughout the church and its buildings.
- 4. Dual flush toilets to reduce water usage.
- 5. Consistent purchase of domestic 100% recycled paper goods.

Community and Volunteer Support Worker Cafe Oasis at Sutton Coldfield United Reformed Church

Part Time, 18 hours per week, normally Monday, Tuesday, Friday, 9 am to 3 pm but with some flexibility. Real living wage (currently £9.90 per hour). Currently funded until September 2023

Café Oasis is our community at Sutton Coldfield United Reformed Church in the centre of the Royal Town. The Community and Volunteer Support Worker (CVSW) role is key to our building relationships with community groups, volunteers, carers and café customers.

The Community and Volunteer Support Worker (CVSW) will:

- connect and build relationships with other community groups enabling the
 provision of assistance, support, and encouragement for the continuing and
 increasing needs of the café service users, its volunteers (some with learning
 difficulties), and their carers.
- develop links with smaller charities and self-help groups and help people develop such groups to try out their ideas through building community relationships, forming new links with other groups in our local community through local networking.
- working together with the existing Café Oasis team to assist in attracting new volunteers, while developing the necessary pastoral and developmental support for existing volunteers.
- working to support the needs of the Café customers many of whom are elderly and feel isolated.

The role also includes developing links with:

- the Parish Nurse, based at the church centre, to improve health care where needed and to develop health education for all involved at the café.
- café volunteers.
- food bank
- local Neighbourhood Networking Scheme
- other community links (e.g. Town Council, Community Hub)
- Customers receiving home delivered meals as well as those attending on site.

The CVSW will need to be energetic, curious, and committed to supporting people to reach their full potential and adaptable to respond to the developing situation and the reopening of the café and meeting facilities.

Neighbourhood Forum: Commonwealth Games update

With only a handful of weeks to go until the Commonwealth Games Triathlon comes to Boldmere, excitement is really building up.

Each race will have 4 laps and so there will be plenty of opportunity to see the cyclists.

Boldmere's high street will be buzzing but won't be able to accommodate all 30,000 expected visitors so we are hoping that residents along the course will prepare in a big way for this once in a lifetime event.

Some suggestions of how you can get involved.

Use a long coaxial TV lead and put your TVs in the front garden so neighbours and others can enjoy watching the swimming and running.

Decorate the pavement and your driveways and walls using pavement chalk (chunky) with flags and pictures.

Putting up flags or bunting outside your house for the team(s) you are supporting and getting small flags to wave. (bunting only on private land not pavements)

Put out some chairs on the pavement for both yourselves and visitors to the area and welcome visitors with a hot or cold drink.

Boldmere Futures have used funding from Triathlon England to provide street entertainers around the cycling course before and between races around the residential areas and then after the races in Boldmere's high street. This will include a magician, stilt walker, Spider Man, balloon modeller and a clown. Look out for them as they will be moving around the course.

Boldmere Neighbourhood Forum are also excited that we will soon be able to reveal a top secret new feature arriving in Boldmere at the beginning of July. Watch this space and keep an eye out on the streets.



Flying the Flag for Boldmere

Boldmere Futures are delighted to present a trail of 59 flags around the Boldmere area that will be launched in early July. Each flag will be attached to a lamppost or signpost and will include a flag of the Commonwealth and a QR code. Anybody can participate and it doesn't all have to be done on one day, in fact it's a great trail to spread out over a few evenings.



The trail starts by Powell's Pool at Boldmere Gate where there will be a commemorative plaque to form part of Boldmere's new history of hosting the Triathlon for the Commonwealth Games. The trail then finishes in the heart of Boldmere where there will be a new 8m high flagpole installed.

Scanning a QR code (just use your mobile phone camera app) will take you to a web page which will tell you what the country is and some more information about that country's flag. We've shown a sample of what the flags will look like, but in order not to spoil the surprise, we've blurred out some of the content.

There will be two trail maps available. One will be in a printed format which we hope to distribute to all homes in Boldmere, but will also be available from local shops in Boldmere. This map will also be available as a printable download on the website www.boldmere.org/flags where you can also find out more about the project.

The other map will be an interactive map that you can use on a mobile device to see the locations in real-time and monitor your own position using GPS. Clicking on a flag will tell you about the location of the flag including a photograph of the location.

Pippa Goode & Paul Long of Boldmere Futures have managed the project "We're now hoping that members of our community will now contribute artwork, videos, dances, poetry or personal stories related to each country (or flag's physical location) that can be shown on each flag's web page. "

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING THE COMMONWEALTH GAMES TRIATHLON AND PARA TRIATHLON IN SUTTON PARK: FRI 29 AND SUN 31 JULY

The Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games are rapidly approaching and we're making sure you know how the Triathlon and Para Triathlon will impact local residents and businesses with road and parking restrictions on Friday 29 and Sunday 31 July.

Restrictions on local roads

The map overleaf shows the road restrictions in place for the event. Some local roads in Boldmere will be used for the bike element of the Triathlon, and the roads within this 'field of play' will be closed to keep the athletes, staff, spectators and public safe. The roads forming the cycle route (in dark green on the map overleaf) will need to be clear of parked cars from 6pm on Thursday 28 and Saturday 30 July. Any vehicles on the roads after this time will be towed.

All other road closures and restrictions are formally in place from 6am to 6pm on both Friday 29 and Sunday 31 July. Local residents on closed roads within the field of play have between 6am and 9.15am to leave the area in their cars via staffed vehicle crossing points (shown in light green on the map overleaf). Residents can return in their cars via the vehicle crossing points when the final athlete has completed the course and it is safe to reopen the roads.

People are able to walk around the area, and there will be marshals on hand to assist people to cross the field of play safely where needed using the clearly signed pedestrian crossing points.



Vesey Forum - 02 July 2022 14.30 The Effects of the Triathlon Event upon Boldmere, Vesey Ward and Sutton Coldfield

Over 40 local residents ignored the rain and attended this meeting at the Newman Community Centre in Boldmere. The meeting was jointly chaired by Councillor Rob Pocock and Councillor Kath Scott, and they were assisted by Sarah Boundy from the Commonwealth Games organisers and Donna Jones from the Community Police Service.

The triathlon events will take place on the 29th and 31st July, two races on each day. Each event will comprise of a swimming race in Powells Pool, a cycling race around the streets of Boldmere and a running section within



Sutton Park. Several roads will have to be closed and free of parked vehicles (even those of the residents), other roads and areas will be restricted for most of the days in question.

There will be several roadblocks and marshals stationed around the course. Contingency measures will be in place for emergency vehicles. Tickets for selected areas of prime viewing have been sold out but around 20,000 visitors are expected in all and pedestrians will be free to roam around the course as the events develop. There will be BBC coverage at key points and there will be additional catering facilities, particularly in Sutton Park.

The event will require considerable traffic management and bus routes will take diversions. Vehicles left in certain roads required for the cycling event would be towed away if parking restrictions were ignored.

It is intended to deliver explanatory leaflets to every house directly affected by the triathlon, and a letter will be delivered to each house and business in a wider area by 18 July.

A member of the audience asked about the proposed "Taxi - rank" in Cofield Road and whether the normal congestion of that road and access for home care vehicles had been taken into consideration. Response: The stretch of road for taxis is marked to inform visitors where to go to access a taxi. Measures will be taken to ensure taxis do not obstruct the flow of traffic.

Others in the audience asked why the roads were closed for so many hours when the cycling sections of each race would only last 30 minutes, and why the whole event could not be held within the park. Response: The organisation of all events is governed by the International Commonwealth Games organisation and there are laid down regulations concerning preparations for the course to be secured in whatever country the games are to be held in a given year. Sutton Park does not have sufficient hard surfaced roads to hold the cycling section within the park.

In answer to other questions, it was made clear that traders in the area could remain open but not take deliveries, entertainment would be provided, and there were contingency measures for litter control.

Several organisations will benefit from grants associated with the Games. Recipients include Friends of Mossy Bank, Friends of the Spinney, Gatepost newsletter and King George Playing Fields. Friends of Mossy Bank will be investing in increased bio-diversity - planting poppies and cornflowers, research into the Manor House which once occupied the site, helped by living relatives of the inhabitants. Friends of the Spinney will be organising events and tours and increasing their publications.

The meeting concluded with other local matters:

- 1. Boldmere Festival on 17 July.
- 2. £20,000 extra has been gained for lowering kerbs at junctions in the area.
- 3. The traffic island at the junction of Monmouth Drive and Stonehouse Road is to be made more visible following a series of vehicle strikes.
- 4. Speedwatch scheme is to continue, possibly at a lower rate.
- 5. Schools Bill is currently at the House of Lords. New regulations are coming in. Kath Scott is leading the response from Birmingham City Council.

The meeting closed at 16.05.



Here is a review and a few snippets, provided by Hannah Sunderland

It's no secret that our local community is filled with creatives and the latest thing to come from that pool of talent is A Soldier's Story, the epic tale of John William Hepherd's wartime journey, written and researched by his daughter Carol Anne Yapp.

I asked her to tell us a little about her father's experience and the journey to writing A Soldier's Story.

As with many returning soldiers, my father never spoke about his experiences and, when he passed away, all of that knowledge disappeared along with him. Long before I put pen to paper, I spoke with my mother and she told me that she had destroyed all the letters that had passed between her and my father during the war years. I was astounded that she'd burn all of that history and it left me with questions that I thought I would never know the answers to.

After my mother passed away in 2004, I found dad's medals along with a box containing old family photographs. Whilst I was looking through this wonderful collection, I came across a letter that dad had written in 1943. The contents of this letter were unbelievable and something stirred inside me making me want to know more.

Beginning in 1941 he wrote of how he sailed from Liverpool in a convoy of troop ships to Bombay, then, on arrival, travelled 700 miles to Lahore and eventually his unit was sent to Egypt.

A after many months of heavy shelling, the line fell to Rommel's army and he managed to escape to safety with only 37 men of the battalion.

He was then sent to Cyprus to refit and became part of the reformed Kings Own Royal Regiment.

After reading this, I needed to know more and after two years of research and speaking to historians, I discovered that the battalion was sent to fight on the Island of Leros.

When this too was taken by the Germans, he was placed on a cattle truck and taken to a prisoner of war camp in Poland.

Miraculously and after many trials and battles, he finally made it home to his wife, after five years.

John William Hepherd's story is one of immense courage. He was wounded in 1943, held captive in a prisoner of war camp and nearly died from a combination of double pneumonia, pleurisy and starvation during the long march to freedom.


When the coffin was processed in with no family members following and the priest's opening words were, "We say farewell to a beloved **Sister.**" my worst fears were now confirmed. I was now trapped in the row unable to escape. My main consolling thought was thank goodness I did not put my condolence card on the coffin when I came in, as it had the words, "To a kind and gentle **man.**"

My opportunity to escape came when Holy Communion was taken. I filed out of my row behind the children and spotted a side door, believing it to be my escape route. I was wrong again. This time as I shuffled in and closed the door carefully behind me, I turned to find I had entered a side chapel startling three priests, praying at the altar. Making my apologies I returned from whence I came and exited the Oratory. I recall thinking afterward, "I have lived a Mr. Bean comedy sketch." I was however on safe ground with the committal that followed, I was certain of the address, honest!

I arrived just as the tail end of the family procession was making its way up to the plot. All were looking stern-faced until I apologised for missing the service explaining my error. Much mirth ensued along the procession of mourners.


I was asked if I was coming to the wake or did I have more funerals to attend that day?

Sutton Trust plant Yew tree to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee

<u>Sutton Coldfield Charitable Trust</u> was joined by the local community to plant a Yew tree at Manorial Wood, as part of the Queen's Canopy tree planting initiative to mark her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee.

Chairman of Sutton in Bloom Terry Wood joined SCCT staff and Keith Dudley, Chair of Trustees to plant the commemorative Yew tree, as well as two long-serving almshouse residents, children from Little Sutton Primary School, West Midlands Police Cadets and two local chartered foresters.

Tina Swani, chief executive of Sutton Coldfield Charitable Trust, said: "It's fantastic that we were able to be part of the Queen's Canopy planting at Manorial Wood, and what a great way to mark the Platinum Jubilee.

"We'd like to thank everyone who was involved in the project and for helping us plant the Yew tree, which will be here and part of Sutton Coldfield for generations to come."

The tree planting commemorated a significant milestone in the Queen's reign, celebrating 70 years on the throne, and within that time the Trust - which has origins that can be traced back to the Tudor times – has achieved its own milestones that align with royal events.

1528 – The Royal Charter established the Royal Town of Sutton Coldfield in 1528, during the reign of Henry VIII - father to the first Queen Elizabeth. Four years before she was born, the first ever almshouses were also built at a total cost of £608.

1558 – Queen Elizabeth came to the throne, when Royal Town Sutton Coldfield was celebrating its 30th birthday.

1926 – 10 Almshouses in Walmley were being built, just as Queen Elizabeth II had been born and electricity was installed three years later.

1971 – Princess Anne opened a new Residents' Lounge and 13 dwellings on Walmley site. Trustees decided to rent a TV and buy a piano for the lounge.

Silver Jubilee in 1977 – Sutton Coldfield officially became part of the city of Birmingham. Around this time, the first grants to educational organisations were being made and included awards to five primary schools, a school music association and a sports association.

Ruby Jubilee 1992 – The Trust hit the £1 million mark for grants awarded that year. This is the first time the Trust granted this amount of money, which was a total of £1,357,163 to help individuals and organisations across Sutton Coldfield.

Diamond Jubilee 2012 – The name of the Trust was changed to Sutton Coldfield



Charitable Trust, to reflect the Trust's role more appropriately, within the town, as an independent charity which no longer has a direct association with the local authority. This year, Princess Alexandra opened new warden's flats in Walmley, and more trees were planted to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

Hope Food North Birmingham

Hope Food North Birmingham celebrated it's first anniversary in June. To mark the occasion, we had a small event at our base in Wilmcote Drive. Attendees included supporters, trustees, local councillors and the Mayor of Sutton Coldfield. Pastor Stephen Eaves from the Ark Community Church also performed a blessing.

In our first year, Hope Food has run 163 food banks in Falcon Lodge, Mere Green and Erdington. At these three weekly food banks, we are currently welcoming around 125 people through our doors each week providing food to help support around 330 people. We also delivered 1,839 crates of food, within hours of expiry, to 8 different hostels across the city in the evening between 9 and 11pm.

In addition, we supplied surplus food to other food banks and organisations that run food programmes for the homeless. To date we have made 336 deliveries, donated 1,343 crates of surplus food and delivered 628 food parcels to struggling families.
