Rob Pocock: HOLLYHURST IN A HOLE?

Earlier in the autumn I was contacted by residents in Hollyhurst Road about a growing number of potholes in the road. I got these logged with the Council's contractor company, Kier Highways, who

have the job of filling them in. A while later I had an email back, saying they had inspected the road and there was nothing left to repair. Surprise surprise I went back again a few days later after a tip-off from residents - and the potholes were still there, basking in full glory!

Who knows whether it was a mistake or they just didn't visit – anyway there is no substitute for face-to-face contact. I met personally with the local Kier Highways Steward and showed him photos I had taken of the 6 large holes along the road. He has promised to make the inspection himself this time, and who knows, by the time you read this the work may have actually been marked up on the road and programmed for action!

MORE ON ROADS AND PAVEMENTS

While on the subject of roads and pavements, it was disappointing to see that the Government have withdrawn their funding support for the City Council 'PFI' roads contract with Kier Highways. This was due to last till 2035 and was priced at over £500 million in extra central government support over that period. So we will all need to have to do without that extra funding in future. Despite its financial problems the City Council will still honour its side of the contract, but the total funds for maintaining our roads, pavements, streetlights and trees will drop by over a half in future.

NEXT 'NEW YEAR TIP TRUCK' VISIT

In the New Year we enter the final quarter of the Pilot Project for the 'tip trucks' that the City Council have been laying on across the Sutton Vesey ward. The first visit of the New Year is at the Welshman's Hill site, on Weds 17th January, New Oscott. Drop by any time from 7am to 12.15pm, so if you're planning a Christmas or New Year clear-out of the loft, shed, garage or surplus winter garden waste, all this will be especially welcome!

The funding for this Pilot Project runs out at the end of March and we have applied for a further government funding award to see if it can carry on in future. The roving 'tip trucks' have proved to be one of the most popular things the City Council has done for a long time - so Kath Scott and I, as your City Councillors, will be lobbying like crazy to keep this service going.

As we approach Christmas and get ready to enjoy a well-earned break with family and friends, I wanted to take the opportunity to write to you, readers of Gatepost, about

some of the work that has been going on throughout our brilliant Royal Town.

One of the many joys about being the Royal Town's MP is going round my constituency meeting exceptional people – many of whom put back so much into the community. None more so than Hannah Simnett, who runs a remarkable charity in Boldmere,

Cherished, which has just received the Kings Award for Voluntary Service. I spoke with Hannah about her and her charity's fantastic work. Cherished seeks to help give marginalised girls – and some boys – confidence, guidance, support and encouragement as they chart the difficulties of young life and overcome emotional trauma that can result in behavioural issues. They helped more than 1570 young people change and improve their life outcomes last year and cover a total of 70 schools in

On 15th December, I spent the morning alongside our brilliant West Midlands Mayor Andy Street visiting the new Amazon facility to see their Christmas operation supplying hundreds of thousands of items to thousands of my constituents. I had the pleasant task of opening Amazon Sutton Coldfield earlier this year, which employs 2000 people (exceeding previous estimates of 1600) and has 1100 local good quality jobs, is an investment of £550 million, and produces 3.6 MWh of solar energy.

You can probably tell I am impressed by this 'window on the future', which represents an extraordinary investment in our Town bringing high-quality jobs and local employment opportunities.

I have had the pleasure of visiting several schools recently throughout Royal Sutton, such as Holy Cross school in Walmley where I enjoyed meeting years 5 and 6 and answering their questions. They showed immense interest and concern about the world around them and are going to make a great contribution to Sutton Coldfield and beyond.

It was also a great joy to visit Bishop Vesey's Giving Tree, joining students for their annual project as part of the school's growing success in supporting local charities.

Many of my constituents will rightly be concerned about the recent financial developments at Birmingham City Council, especially with the section 114 (bankruptcy) notice, which is looming over the Royal

Town, threatening our Park and the public services which we rightly expect from our City Council. Rest assured, I will continue to monitor Birmingham City Council and recently met the Chief Executive Deborah Cadman, and the Director of Intervention Response, Rishi Shori. These senior officers work with the current administration of the City Council and the commissioners which the government have put in to run Birmingham council to try to sort it out.

Once again may I wish you a happy new year and a peaceful Christmas. Please remember I and all our councillors are here to help. If ever I can help you, please let me know,

With the significant improvements in provision at our school including a well-planned curriculum, robust assessment processes, clear behaviour expectations and high aspirations for all pupils, the history of poor attainment at Banners Gate Primary has been reversed. All three subjects have positive progress scores this year and all three of these positive progress scores exceed those shared as Birmingham's average. Two of the three scores also exceed the national UK average. A great example of what can happen when we BELIEVE - INSPIRE -ACHIEVE.

NURSERY The nursery children have had an amazing term. They all settled in really quickly and have spent the term building mendships. They have shown confidence and busy trying new things. We have been learning new songs with World Nursery Rhyme week being a huge hit. We have learnt about different celebrations, ending the topic with Christmas and our fabulous Nativity Play. Well done, Nursery!

YEAR 1 Well done to Year 1 for really engaging into their class texts this term. We have read 'Peace at Last' 'Cops and Robbers' and 'Lots' and we have used these texts in our Reading and Writing lessons. Everyone has been fully engaged in these lessons and have created some amazing pieces of work. In particular, they have been able to write a setting description, a character description, a set of instructions and a Winter themed poem.

In Geography, we have also enjoyed learning about maps and the world we live in and in Science, we have explored the human senses. We enjoyed having a visitor in class to tell us about their experience of a sensory loss. We have had lots of fun rehearsing for our nativity of the 'Sleepy Shepherd' and we can't wait for our families to see it. Our teachers are really looking forward to building on our knowledge and skills in the Spring Term.

4WS have had a wonderful start to the academic year. They have written a range of writing genres from diary entries to adventure narratives and studied The Iron Man, How To Train Your Dragon and This IS Our World in Reading. The children took part in the No Pens Day and were learning how to communicate effectively using body language, listening skills and clear speech. Year 4 have worked extremely hard with their times tables. Every child has been focussed on the speed of their recall for each times table and have completed weekly Times Table Clubs to show how far they have progressed. YEAR 5 Year 5 have been reading the texts 'Illustrated Stories from China', 'Footpath Flowers', 'Wonder' and 'Amazing Muslims from Around the World'. The skill they have been learning about is retrieval, inference and summarising. They have produced some lovely pieces of writing including, narrative stories, poetry, a formal persuasive letter, a biography about their chosen significant Muslim figure and a setting description. In Maths, children have been learning about place value within 1, 000, 000, addition and subtraction, multiplication and division such as factors, common factors and prime numbers. We are so proud of all of their hard work this term and wish everyone a super Christmas break.

RECEPTION Since starting school in September, the children have all settled into school life and routines brilliantly! They have learned lots of sounds through our phonics lessons and are using them to become super readers and writers. The children are also becoming knowledgeable in number and have enjoyed learning about shapes. We are so proud of the progress the reception children have made already! We are looking forward to our new projects in the Spring term.

YEAR 2 Year 2 have had a fantastic term with lots of brilliant learning from the very beginning. We have enjoyed different topics such as Movers and Shakers in History, Habitats in Science and learning how to be kind and respectful to others in PSHE. We have had lots of fun learning opportunities as well, making birds' nests out of chocolate, exploring our playground for minibeasts, using the iPads and even getting to go on the library bus. All in all, Miss Trowman and Mr Pugh are so proud of everything Year 2 have achieved so far, We cannot wait to see how much they continue to prow in the New Year.

VEAR 3 This term Year 3 have worked extremely hard in all subjects. They have shown great enthusiasm and passion towards their learning and have contributed their ideas into learning. Children have worked hard to work on expanding their knowledge and have shown this throughout this term. We are extremely proud of how far they have come since September and all of their achievements. Well done Year 3 and keep it up!

VEAL o Team 6 have had a wonderful term, they have worked incredibly hard in all areas; we have thoroughly enjoyed reading A Christmas Carol and we have used the text as a stimulus to write persuasive letters and setting descriptions. In Maths, we have been learning all about fractions. As well as this, we have thoroughly enjoyed learning about Maafa and the African slave trade, the children took a real interest and were very engaged in this topic. Year Six as a whole have shown superb resilience and determination during practise SATs week, so well done!

NURTURE GROUP Nurture 1 have been working hard with their narrative writing this term, using story maps to support their individual story structures and what wonderful story lines we have come up with! In Forest school, we have been developing our teamwork and problem-solving skills through den building with tarps, cords, and pegs.

Nurture 2 have been building their number knowledge counting to 20 and beyond and have been working hard at number composition within 10. They have been exploring their creativity this term, making artwork for their classroom environment and also outdoors during forest school with natural resources.

Annual health checks for those who are diagnosed with dementia

Information for those who are living with dementia, their families, loved ones and carers

Are you a person living with dementia or do you care for somebody that is living with a type of dementia? (for example Alzheimer's disease, Vascular Disease, Frontotemporal

Did you know that if you are diagnosed with dementia, you are entitled to a free annual health check. It is important to undertake annual health checks and it is a key part to an individual's care and well-being.

What is an Annual Health check?

An Annual Health Check is a discussion between you and a Health Care Professional (Nurse, Advanced Health Practitioner, GP) to see how things are going and offer local support on matters which you may find challenging.



Why do you need an Annual Health Check?

The health check will help you keep healthy and get the right support you need if there are any changes to your body or the way you are feeling

How do you get an Annual Health Check?

Each year the patient will be contacted by their registered GP Practice before their annual health check is due. If you provide support to a person living with dementia, and want to arrange an annual health check, then please contact your GP Practice.

What if you want an Annual Health Check but haven't had one?

- You or a member of your family can contact your GP Practice and ask for an Annual Health Check appointment
- Tell your GP Practice that you have dementia so they can give you the right

How long does an Annual Health Appointment last?

20-30 mins



What help might you need?

- Ask for help if you feel that you might be distressed about going to the GP Practice by yourself
- If you find it hard to tell the Health Care Professional how you are feeling or are worried about having an health check, you can take a member of your family or someone that knows you well
- Maybe write down a list of questions you might want to ask the Health Care Professional



What happens during the Annual Health Check?

- The Health Care Professional will ask all about you and how things are at
- Review medication/weight/height and carry out blood tests
- identify any changes in behaviour and offer some solutions
- Review planning for the future conversations by identifying a person's wishes and preferences
- Offer personalised support by referring the patient or someone who is caring for them to a number of services including: Dementia advisors Social support, finance support, Birmingham Carers Hub, Carers Trust Solihult, Alzheimer's Society, Memory Assessment Service

12 Days of Crime Prevention - Vehicle theft

On the third day of Christmas, my local police gave to me: crime prevention advice to protect my vehicle and car key!

Thieves are checking the handles and checking them twice. They want to know if you've left it unlocked or alone to de-ice.

We are still seeing a high number of vehicles being stolen every day across the West Midlands. Criminals are not just focusing on luxury cars – we have seen reports of all makes and models being stolen from driveways and car parks.

There are quick and free ways to protect you and your vehicle right now:

- Take your keys out the ignition, lock your car and check the handle
- Check for the signs your car is locked wing mirrors in, lights flash, alarm on
- · Keep your keys away from windows and doors to avoid thieves using a signal relay attack to open your car
- · When out and about, share your location with trusted people
- Remove tools from your van or install a van safe to deter criminals
- Keep your car in the garage or apply a steering wheel lock.

Why not gift someone a steering lock, a Faraday pouch, or a Ghost system for their vehicle?

Don't make your vehicle cosy for criminals! Stay with your vehicle as it defrosts or use de-icer, a scraper, or a warm cloth to help speed up the process. Your insurance will not cover you for vehicles stolen with keys left in the ignition.

New car tax rules will give the Treasury an extra £2.4 billion a year by 2029



New VED (Vehicle Excise Duty) rates will give the Treasury an extra £2.4 billion a year by 2029, according to a new report from the Office for Budget Responsibility (OBR).

Commonly known as <u>car tax</u>, the economic and fiscal outlook report forecasts VED receipts will increase from £8 billion to over £10.4 billion within the next six years. The report stated that the rise in car tax revenues can be attributed to inflation and VED exemption for electric vehicles (EVs) ending in 2025.

Electric vehicle road tax will see more than one million extra drivers having to pay VED every year.

On Wednesday 22nd November, Chancellor Jeremy Hunt delivered his Autumn Statement to Parliament and according to the OBR, VED cost drivers over £7.3 billion in the last financial vear.

With electric vehicles increasing in numbers across the UK and a general election looming, the estimations could change in the years ahead.

There are already more than one million EVs in use in the UK, according to the annual Motorparc data from the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders (SMMT), which was published in April 2023.

With the Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) mandate coming into force next year, 22% of all car manufacturers sales will need to be fully electric – adding to the numbers that will be appearing on the roads. This number will increase incrementally until 2035.

The OBR document stated: "The main policy driver for EV uptake is now the Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) mandate which takes effect in January 2024.

"We have therefore revised our EV assumption to match the path of the mandate over the forecast horizon.

"We judge sales are unlikely to materially exceed this across the forecast horizon due to flexibilities that allow trading of allowances and borrowing against future allowances in the first three years of the mandate."



Warning to drivers across the UK over fake parking apps being advertised on Google



New research from Which? has highlighted that drivers are falling victim to fake parking apps being advertised on search engines.

As a result, the public are being urged to avoid Google, Yahoo and Bing search engines when attempting to download parking apps.

The false ads attempt to trick drivers into paying for expensive subscriptions they don't want or need when looking to park.

In order to avoid any issues, it is important for all drivers to download apps from the official Apple or Google Play app stores.

Which? stated that similar tactics from fraudsters have historically been used to get drivers to give their card details to fake third-party websites instead of Transport for London to pay ULEZ charges.

There are many apps available to download from the stores on mobile devices, but the scammers have created fake adverts using their branding and messaging. They then appear at the top of the searches, creating the platform to take money from drivers.

A challenge for the real parking companies is that after the scammers get their website shut down, they start a similar one with a new domain – and the issue repeats itself.

Parking Charge Notices - what you need to know

Many of the fake adverts claim to offer a 'free download' but then hide identical small print at the bottom of their websites revealing high monthly fees charges to an unnamed company.

Google and the other search engines continue to display these false advertisements when someone looks to pay for parking online – despite Which? contacting them weeks before releasing their report.

The research from Which? found that there were a higher number of fake adverts on Google compared to its competitors.

In response, Google said it removes adverts that violate its policies and that under its misrepresentation policy, it doesn't allow ads that deceive users by excluding relevant product information or providing misleading information.

Google and the other search engines – along with social media giant Meta – will be legally obliged to remove scams and other harmful content under the new Online Safety Act.

If you are searching for a parking app on Google and come across a fake advert, you can report it to the Advertising Standards Authority.

Copycat Royal Mail websites flog phoney stamps

The price of stamps has risen again this year, and with the holiday season approaching you might be looking for ways to save when sending cards and gifts. However, scammers are unsurprisingly taking the opportunity to impersonate Royal Mail with fake offers for stamps at bargain prices.

Dodgy ads on Facebook for these phoney offers lead to phishing websites designed to steal your personal and financial information. See what these scams look like and learn how to spot a dodgy post and website.

'A scammer tried to sell me Taylor Swift tickets'

A Which? member got in touch after a scammer targeted her on Facebook with fake Taylor Swift tickets for £100.

The victim was on a budget and asked their local community Facebook group if anyone had tickets they'd like to sell. The scammer sent a fake Ticketmaster email to convince the victim the tickets were real. They then asked for payment via bank transfer, and when the victim confronted the scammer, their Facebook page disappeared.

Fake ads impersonate parking apps

We're warning drivers to avoid searching for parking apps online and instead download official apps through Apple or Google Play app stores. These sneaky scams are easy to fall for, take a look at some examples so you can avoid them.

You may see ads displayed within your search results when you use a search engine such as Google or Bing. Although they are intended to attract your attention and clicks, scammers often exploit this idea by creating fake ads that can jeopardise your data and money.

CALLING ALL QUILTERS! OR ARE YOU INTERESTED IN LEARNING ABOUT QUILTING? WANT TO IMPROVE YOUR SKILLS AND TECHNIQUES? WHY NOT COME TO OUR GROUP?

Sutton Coldfield Trinity Quilters was founded in 1996, our aims are to further the skill and art of patchwork and quilting. We meet at Holy Trinity Parish Church, Mill Street twice per month: the second Tuesday evening from 7.30-9.30 pm and the fourth Wednesday afternoon from 2.30-4.30 pm. Our programme runs from September to July each year.

ABOUT OUR MEETINGS: Our meetings are varied: we invite quilters to come along to give talks, demonstrations and workshops in their particular specialism, as well as sit and sew meetings, social evenings, demonstrations. We also have regular workshops and Show and Tell evening. We have two trips a year, one to the Malvern Quilt Show in May and another to a quilting outlet for retail therapy (different each year).

Our new programme commenced on 12 September 2023 and we have a good mix of speakers, workshops, sit and sew sessions.

WHO CAN JOIN? Anyone who is interested in patchwork and quilting - you don't need to be an expert! We positively welcome beginners to the craft and members are more than willing to share their knowledge. In addition, one of our members is a qualified P&Q teacher and runs workshops and classes in and around Sutton Coldfield.

WHAT KIND OF THINGS DO YOU MAKE? Quilts aren't just things you put on beds: we make bags, cushions, even clothing! Quilts can be "traditional" or modern, contemporary, illusions, memory quilts, pictures, miniatures, etc. If you are a complete beginner, start by making a bag or small cushion or cot quilt. Many members also make quilts for Linus UK, a charity which gives quilts to children and young people in hospital, hospice or in need. Whilst we do not "make" things at meetings, we have demonstrations and workshops and some sit and sew sessions. We have a collection of "how to" notes and patterns for beginners to help start their quilting journey.

HOW MUCH WILL IT COST? Members pay an annual subscription of £20, due in September (or £10 from January), plus £4 for each meeting attended. Visitors are welcome and pay £5 per meeting attended.

BENEFITS OF MEMBERSHIP: Firstly, you'll benefit from the skills and expertise of fellow quilters as well as a reduced attendance fee. We have an extensive library for the use of members, for a small borrowing fee.

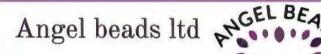

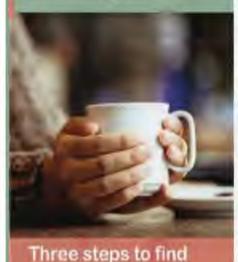

Council Support Schemes

People on low incomes may be eligible for Housing Benefit. Council Tax Support and Discretionary Housing Payment from the council. This will depend on your current circumstances. You may also be eligible for a Council Tax Discretionary Hardship Payment Crisis Grant or Community Support Grant Paym

Maximise Your Income

Anyone who is struggling financially can get a benefit check and speak to an advisor for free and confidential advice. A tenefit check can ensure that you are receiving all the money you're entitled to, especially if your circumstances have changed recently. Speaking to an advisor could also help you find cheaper deals on things like gain and electricity and make sure you're not resising out on things like school collining grants or free school means.

Debt can happen to anyone. Free advice and support can help you find ways to manage your debts and reduce how much you pay each month.

Benefit Advance

If you have made a new claim for benefit and are in financial hardship white you wait to your first payment, you may be able to get an advance to afford things like rent or food. It's important to get advice before taking out an advance. Benefit advances must be paid back, and the money will be taken from your future benefit payments (a loain).

Hardship Payment

If you have been sanctioned, you may be able to request a hardship payment from the Jobcentre. Hardship payments are not always part immediately, and they re not available to everyone. Hardship payments of Universal Credit need to be paid back (a loan), but hardship payments of Job Sesters Allowance of Employment Support Allowance do not (not a loan).
